Dearest Ones:

When I wrote to you last wasn't I in the throes of helpang Velva Brown get ready for the showers that we were giving Katherine Bohn? Well, the affair came off last Wonday night and was really a grand affair. Everybody helped to make it a success and everybody consequently had a very good time.

It doesn't sound much like hard times, but this mission wedding business happens just about once in a lifetime and we have to make the most of our opportunities and give Kay as good a send-off as we can. About three weeks beforehand we sent out invitations to all the women missionaries as follows:

"Please come to the Brown Dungelow, behind the Green Gate, on Eay View Bouleward, on Monday evening, Pebruary mineteenth, at seven o'clock. A chairing dish supper will be served, and you are invited to bring your knitting or other wank hand-work, while we enjoy one more evening of Kathrine's spinsterhood.
