An afternoon reception and tea will be held next Tuesday afternoon, June 8th on the Miller's lawn to welcome Dr. and Mrs. Paul Monroe, and also to honor Dr. Wei, and other members of the faculty who are leaving this year.

The wedding of Mr. Richard Viguers to Miss Ruth Hill was solemnized in St. Paul's Chapel last Wednesday, June 2nd, at 4 P.M. The reception which followed was attended by nearly 80 of the faculty and friends of the couple.

Dr. Wei has managed to get himself included in a large party travelling from Shanghai to Dairen by boat, thence across to Manchouli and on to London via Siberia. He expects to leave the college on June 18th in order to sail from Shanghai on June 22nd.

The papers from Canton have been delayed but are expected this week end.

The meeting of examiners for Hua Chung seniors will be held on Friday afternoon to pass on candidates, and to assign thesis to different members for reading and approval.

Anxiety of the college authorities over the outcome of a disagreement with the Provincial Government concerning the purchase of land - whether it should be a deeded purchase or merely a perpetual lease, - was ~~also~~ happily settled by a notice in the Chinese papers at Nanking, translated by Dr. Wei as follows:

"Nanking, June 1st, (Central) - The following regulations governing the purchases of land by educational institutions above the senior middle school grade founded by aliens were considered, revised and approved by the Executive Yuen on June 1st:

- (1) Such purchases of land must have the approval of the provincial and municipal authorities, the Ministry of the Interior and the Ministry of Education.
- (2) Land thus purchased shall be used exclusively for the extension of the institution itself, and never for any of its auxiliary organizations, nor for a profit making enterprise, a religious enterprise, or any other non-educational enterprises. In case such abuse of the school land be detected, it shall be subject to action of the government authorities concerned or the land may be taken back by the government at the original price.
- (3) If and when the institution stops functioning, such school land shall be disposed of by the educational authorities concerned according to Article 23 of the Regulations governing Private Educational Institutions, (which provides that if the school should cease to function, leaving no Board of Directors with power to act, its property shall be disposed of by the educational authorities concerned.)
- (4) If the institution has been founded by any alien person or by any alien body or if there are still alien bodies participating in its Board of Directors, it must have been registered with the Ministry of Education for at least five years, aided by the Government and been operating entirely in accordance with the government regulations, before it is entitled to this privilege of purchasing land.

- (5) Anything concerning purchase of land not provided for by this regulation is subject to the Chinese Land Act. Any purchase of land by the school shall be in the name of the school, with title ~~and~~ deeds signed by the Chinese Chairman of the Board of Directors or the Chinese Head of the institution, with the provisions in this regulation inserted."

In view of the national emergency the college administration and a committee of nine students, one representative from each major department, are trying to make arrangements by which practical extra-curricular courses may be given, to render more effective the service the students are rendering to their country.

On Sunday last a meeting of Wuhan educationists was held in Stokes Hall to organize an educational society to devise methods of action in the national emergency. Dr. Hwang was present and extended a welcome to the meeting in the name of the College.

The Hupeh Provincial Government has made a grant of \$179 to the College towards the cost of construction of the college dugouts.

The two new residences outside the compound are now ready for occupation and they will be occupied by Dr. Wesley Wan and Dr. T. W. Shu.

The Rev. & Mrs. R. Hailwood have left the College for Tayeh to undertake evangelistic work in connection with the Methodist Church. Rev. E. R. Pillow has now taken over Mr. Hailwood's duties in the English Department and Poyu Hostel.

We have been approached by the University of Nanking regarding the provision of temporary accomodation for their faculty and students, in the course of their transfer to Chengtu, Szechuan. The College has promised to do its utmost to assist them in this matter.

In last week's bulletin notice was given of a meeting to be held to-day at 2 P.M. at the house of Dr. & Mrs. Lo "for those interest in dramatics". Please note that this meeting is intended only for students taking English majors of doing special work in English; the previous notice should have been worded to this effect.

The usual monthly meeting of the Arts Department will not be held this month.

Yale University has appointed Dr. Francis Wei Visiting Professor of Ethics in the University.

Dr. Hwang has heard from Dr. Francis Wei that Miss Johnston has promised to continue her gift of US\$5,000 per year to the College for another three years.

A Concert will be given, under the auspices and for the benefit of the Y.W.C.A., this evening (Saturday) at 7 P.M. in Stokes Hall. A very excellent programme of vocal and instrumental music will be provided, and tickets at one dollar, or for students forty cents, may be obtained from Mrs. Kwei or at the hall at the time of the Concert. Special tickets may be obtained at five dollars by those specially wishing to help the funds of the Y.W.C.A.

It is hoped that the performance of parts of Handel's "Messiah", for which the College Choral Society is now practising, will be given on the afternoon of Sunday, December 19th.

On Sunday evening last a gathering of Hua Chung Christian Fellowship took place, in the form of a "lovefeast" or supper taken in an atmosphere of worship and fellowship, attemptation to reproduce the spirit of the communal meals held in the earliest days of the Christian Church. This took place in the Men's Dining Hall, and about a hundred members and friends took part. The hall was arranged as a place of worship and the meal conducted with cheerful conversation and good humour, but with order and dignity. Dr. P. V. Taylor presided, Mr. Wang Chia led in prayer, and between the six courses there were short addresses, by Dr. Paul Kwei, Rev. E. R. Pillow, Mr. Liu Sze-yu and Dr. B. K. Chen, and vocal and piano-forte solos by Misses Wen and Chu, of Ginling. This gathering, the first of its kind, was very successful, and it is hoped to hold others in a similar way occasionally.

On Monday last Dr. E. Stanley Jones paid another visit to the College and an informal meeting of the Faculty Christian Fellowship was held when an interesting discussion took place.

A group of about 25 students is preparing two plays to be given for patriotic propaganda purposes in town and villages around Wuhan. The plays, which are sponsored by the Wartime Service Corps and under the leadership of Dr. R. B. Chen, Mr. C. F. Cheng and Mr. F. T. Ma, are entitled "The Poison" and "Lay Down Your Whip".

There will be a very important meeting of the faculty on next Monday afternoon at 4:40 P.M. in the Chemistry Lecture Room. Everyone is urged to attend. This is the third regular monthly faculty meeting of the year.

About 220 students from the University of Nanking are at present living in the Boone School Gymnasium. There are also more than 100 faculty members, 18 of whom have brought their families. They expect to remain here about two months before going on to Szechuan. In the meantime they will start classes here, using our classrooms when they are vacant. Dean Taylor and Mr. Tan are in charge of arrangements, and the college is trying to cooperate in every way possible. The London Mission is loaning their old girls' school property on Tan Hua Ling.

Two of our faculty members will broadcast next week from the Hankow Broadcasting Station on various aspects of Natural Science. Dr. Bien will broadcast on December 6 at 8 o'clock, and Dr. Kwei on December 8 at the same hour.

The new houses outside the city wall are now being occupied by Dr. Wan, Dr. Hsu, Dr. Hwang and Dr. Taylor.

There will be a meeting of the committee of the Hua Chung Christian Fellowship on Tuesday afternoon at 4:30 in the Administration Building, to arrange Christmas celebrations.

The college chorus will meet on Mondays and Thursdays from 6 to 7 during the next two weeks.

Dr. Hwang P'u and Dr. R. B. Chen attended a meeting on December 1 called by four organizations to discuss methods of revising education in this center for meeting the present emergency.

Twenty-four students under the direction of the military officer left yesterday for Hanchuan and various points in the country districts near there to enlighten the country people about the war. They expect to be gone for one week.

Last night at 7 o'clock Miss Sieh Bin Ying, a noted woman writer, addressed a crowded audience of students in Stokes Hall on her personal impressions of the war on the Shanghai front. Miss Sieh has had personal experience as a soldier.

Mr. Hsu Sheh Yu, a noted modern Chinese writer, and professor of Chinese in Cheloo University, gave an impressive address last Monday evening before a very large group of students in Stokes Hall. The lecture, which was arranged by the Extension Lectures Committee, gave special emphasis to the lessons derived from the North China War.

This afternoon at 2 o'clock five men students from Hua Chung will meet a team of Wu-han University in a tennis match at Wu-han.

Dr. Hsiung has made the following report of the laundry work carried on by Hua Chung at the Shiao Tsao Kai Hospital during the month of November:

Clothes washed	7,902
Bed covers washed	386
Clothes mended	420
Bandages sterilized	1,595
Slings sterilized	495

The number of soldiers and officers in the hospital has varied from 736 to 1183.

The Nien Yu Tao Dressing Station, in which Hua Chung College cooperates with the Wuchang Y.W.C.A. and the Ginling College group, has now been opened for two weeks. Several thousand soldiers have already passed through the dressing station. Attention is given to those who have light wounds and more than 90 serious cases have received treatment from the doctor. Only one serious case has died. The soldiers stay one or two days and are then sent on to Hunan. Hua Chung men and women students and the Ginling girls have responded very well in helping to carry wounded soldiers. The station is receiving generous help from the International Red Cross for medical supplies and the service of a full-time doctor. The Hua Chung faculty is supporting a full-time nurse and a clerk. The British Consulate contributed \$200 for dressings. Beds and bedding were donated by Li Yueh of Hankow, while Mr. Wei of Hankow contributed 480 wash basins. Miss Hu, recommended by Miss Ginger of the London Mission, is doing volunteer work at the dressing station.

The Hua Chung students have bought \$599.87 of National Salvation Bonds this week, making a total of \$2,079.87 bought up to date. Miss Tsui Shu Ying, a freshman woman student, has already bought \$60 worth of bonds.

A meeting of the Senate was held on Monday last, and meetings of the Faculty were held on Saturday and Wednesday. Special arrangements have been made about the closing of the present term and about the position of students leaving College before the end of the term, as follows:

The term shall close on December 31st.

A student who leaves with the permission of the College authorities, after December 5th shall get an "Incomplete" as the grade for the first term's work on all year courses. If he returns for the second term in Hua Chung and passes the second term examination at the end of the term his "Incomplete" shall be replaced by a grade no higher than that of his second term examination, and in no case higher than C. In the case of term courses a student leaving after December 5th shall be required to take a supplementary examination not later than six weeks before the end of the second term.

A student leaving before December 5th shall not be given any credit, and students leaving irregularly after December 5th shall not be given the above privileges.

The next regular monthly meeting of the Senate will be held on Monday December 13th at 4:45 P.M. in the President's Office.

Arrangements are being made by which students who have very strong reasons for wishing to remain in the college during the winter vacation may continue to reside in the hostels, under special and strict conditions. The conditions will be submitted to the Senate for approval at its next meeting and will be announced very shortly.

The College will reopen for the Spring Term on February 14th, 1938.

Dr. Wi I. Fang, president of Ginling Girls' College, and Dr. Chen Yu-kwang, president of the University of Nanking, have arrived from Nanking. The Nanking students are about to start classes on the compound, and the Senate has granted to them the privilege of using the classrooms, laboratories, and library.

A party of twenty-three students has returned from a week's tour on propaganda work, and report that they have had a pleasant and profitable time. They visited Hanchuan, Hsinking, Changkiangpu, Yunneng, and Keputan, holding mass meetings and proclaiming the duties of citizenship to the populace, and also gave a play showing the meaning of the present war. They received very kind treatment on their journeys both from local government officials and from members of the Sheng Kung Hwei. A brief report of the trip will be given by a member of the party at the College Assembly on Monday next.

The Committee of the Hua Chung Christian Fellowship which met last Tuesday decided to support the appeal made by the Wuhan Christian Wartime Service Association for funds to provide Christmas gifts for wounded soldiers in Wuhan, and to ask for subscriptions for this purpose from faculty and students. It was suggested that members of the Fellowship might this year apply the money usually spent at Christmas in entertaining within the college to this object.

The committee also decided to hold a service on Christmas Eve, December 24th, in the Church of the Nativity, at 8:30 P.M. and to hold a social evening after this at which Hua Chung students might entertain as guests the students from Ginling and Nanking University living on the compound.

The college chorus now practising "The Messiah" is becoming depleted in numbers owing to the member of students leaving the college, and all members of the chorus are urged to attend without fail the rehearsal on Monday next at 6 P.M. and subsequent rehearsals. Any members leaving the College are asked to be sure to return their copies of "The Messiah" before leaving.

All Chinese members of the faculty have contributed 2% of their November salary to the work of the College Wartime Service Corps.

Of this amount \$142.77 has been spent to date, leaving a balance in hand of \$446.46. In addition 480 wash-basins have been given by the Yee Tsoong Tobacco Company.

On Christmas Eve, December 24, the College Christian Fellowship is holding a joint service with Boone School in the Sheng Tang T'ang at 6 P.M. As our numbers are sadly depleted and this will be the only Christmas service on the compound, all are urged to attend.

In spite of the dangers of the war situation, the College is still carrying on its work with a full staff.

About 100 Nanking students and faculty members have left for Ichang and Chungking. Some of them, however, are still living on the compound.

About 17 men students have decided to join the Instruction Work of the Militia in Hwangpei. They have been leaving yesterday and today.

\$105 was collected in the College for the Christmas fund of the Wuhan Christian Wartime Service Association, which is distributing Christmas gifts to all the wounded soldiers in Wuhan. This amount was made up as follows:

During the past week 40 beds, contributed by Mr. Li Yueh, have been added to the Dressing Station at Nien Yu Tao, bringing the total up to 70. Since the Red Cross has found the work well managed, it is bearing the additional expenses for medical supplies, as well as paying the salaries of four more nurses. Students of the University of Nanking living on this compound have contributed \$42 to support a nurse for three months. \$156.70 has come from the American Community in West China Union University through Dr. Reeves. The Local Rotary Club has promised to give \$21 per month for a laundry woman and part of the rent.

The Executive Committee of the Yen Hostel Committee met at 3:30 yesterday in Miss Johnson's apartment to discuss next semester's arrangements.

The term examinations will be held during this week, and the College will close with the last scheduled class on Friday, December 31st.

Teachers are requested to be certain that they have sent their vacation addresses and the term syllabi in the various courses to the Dean's office before they leave.

A meeting of the Senate was held on December 23rd at 5 P.M. to consider the possibility of moving the College to another place for next term, and especially a suggestion that the College might re-open at Shenchow, Hunan. After three hours' discussion no decision was reached and the Senate met again on December 24th at 2:30 P.M. After another two hours' discussion and consideration from every point of view, it was decided that the suggested move should not be made. It was urged in favour of the move that it would preserve the continuity of the College, that it would keep a large proportion of the Faculty together, and that it would enable the Senior students to complete their college work. On the other hand, it was felt that to move the College would involve a degree of responsibility for students and Faculty which the College could not accept, that there would be a danger of students being cut off from their homes, that there would be dangers in the country no less than in Wuhan, and that owing to the difficulty of securing suitable accommodation for science equipment etc. it would be difficult to do any worthwhile work. The College will therefore re-open here on February 14th, 1938.

A circular letter has been prepared and sent to the parents of all students informing them of the intended date of re-opening, but stating that another letter will be sent during the vacation confirming this. The letter also informs parents of the regulations and arrangements made regarding the term's work and credits for students who have left College before the end of the term.

A cable has been received from the Associated Board of Christian Colleges, in New York, reading, "We send Christian greetings. Fully appreciate courage and devotion of staff and student body. Every effort will be made to secure emergency funds."

A short service of worship, consisting mainly of Christmas music, was held in the Church of the Nativity on Christmas Eve, December 24th at 6 P.M. Owing to the national crisis other forms of Christmas celebrations were on a very restrained and modified scale this year, as compared with normal years, but Dr. Hwang P'u gave a party for education students on Christmas Eve, student members of the College Christian Fellowship entertained some students of Nanking University, and a party was held in Yen Hostel, in addition to other small gatherings.

The College Physical Training Director, Mr. Shao Tze Po, was baptised in the Church of the Nativity on Christmas Day.

The last College Assembly of the term was held on Monday, December 27th, and was addressed by Mr. Ma Feng Shen, who pointed out a number of lessons to be gained from the past five months' war of resistance, including the lack of and need for a religious spirit, faith and courage in facing Japanese aggressi

Parts of Handel's "Messiah" were sung in the Church of the Nativity on Sunday, December 21st, by the College Choral Society, under the leadership of Mr. Charles Higgins and with the help of other friends. RETURN OF HIGGINS AND EDUARD TAYLOR

The Rev. Charles Higgins and Mr. Eduoard Taylor returned last Tuesday, Jan. 3rd, from Hongkong, via Haifong, after having been away for almost 8 weeks. They brought back two trucks, one purchased with college money, and the other is a donation of Mr. Richard D. Shipman. They drove the trucks back all the way from Haifong via Lungchow, a trip of four days.

LETTER FROM COLLEGE TREASURER

A letter dated Dec. 2nd has been received from Mr. John Coe, our Treasurer in charge of buildings and property in Wuhan. Up to the date of the writing, conditions seem to be comparatively favorable in the college, with 5,000 refugees filling practically all the college buildings except the library, the laboratories, the Administration Hall, the Yen Hostel Extension, and some of the smaller residences. We have no way to know about conditions after Dec. 2nd. Mr. Coe's letter was sent to Shanghai and relayed to Hongkong whence the Rev. Charler Higgins brought it to Kweilin.

AIR MAIL FROM ANDERSON

Several letters by air-mail have been received from Asst. Prof. D. F. Anderson in Hongkong. We are glad to have news of Mrs. Anderson's improved conditions in health.

DR. T. C. FAN

Dr. T.C. Fan, formerly General Secretary of the Church of Christ in China, appointed Professor of Sociology in the college, is visiting in Kweilin on his way to Chungking. It is much to our disappointment that Dr. Fan has not been able to join the college and teach in the short-handed Department of Sociology and History. We are proud, however, that he has been doing much splendid work for the wounded soldiers in Hankow and lately in Hunan. He had a narrow escape in leaving Hankow just before the evacuation of Wuhan cities.

COLLEGE GIFT TO BAPTIST HOSPITAL STAFF

The Faculty War Relief Committee made a gift of \$150, national currency, to the Staff of the Baptist Hospital for buying beddings after the bad air-raid of Dec. 29th.

COLLEGE LIGHTING

After the air raid of Dec. 29, we went without electric light for several days. The repairs of the lines have now been completed.

KWEILIN'S COLD-SPELL

For the first time we experienced the famous cold spell in Kweilin, which brought the thermometer down to 36° inside the house. For heating in the college office, we have a charcoal pan which enables the staff to use their fingers without feeling clumsy. This is the only winter luxury we have.



HUA CHUNG RE-OPENS IN HSICHOW

After a recess of three months during which the college moved from Kweilin to Hsichow in Yunnan province, we are glad to report that we were able to resume work again in Hsichow. College registration for the second semester was completed by May 5th, and regular teaching began on Monday, May 8th. Most of the members of the Faculty had arrived then, and about 90 students were present for the first day's instruction. Final registration has come up since to 108, of whom 35 are women and 73 men, not counting the 9 women and 12 men of the Canton Union Theological College.

The students are now housed in two Chinese Quadrangles, one for men and one for women. Dr. B. K. Chen and family are living in the boys' compound, while Miss Bleakley, Dr. T. G. Djang and Dr. K. C. Chang and their families are staying with the girls. Other members of the faculty and staff are mostly accommodated in two Faculty Quadrangles.

All college activities are carried on three temples which have been rented and remodelled for college use. Enough space has been found for class-rooms, offices and the library. Separate houses for the School of Science laboratories are under construction and may be completed in another month.

Hsichow is a nice little village with a population of 5000. It is about 7,000 feet above sea-level. Natural beauty is furnished by the famous mountains Tien Ts'ang Shan and the lake Er Hai. The lake is within 20 minutes' walk from the college, and provides a convenient bathing beach.

FIRST FACULTY MEETING IN HSICHOW

Hua Chung Faculty met for the first time in Hsichow on last Saturday, May 13th. The President took the opportunity to address the Faculty. Among other things, the Faculty voted to accept the President's recommendation that Department Heads be asked to study the question of the desirability of curriculum modification for the next academic year so that more timely and practical subjects may be introduced.

ADMISSIONS COMMITTEE ACTS

The Admissions Committee appointed by the Faculty, consisting of Assistant Professor D. F. Anderson, Professor D. S. Hsiung, Professor Bleakley, Assistant Professor Pao, and Dean Taylor met last Thursday morning and made plans for College Entrance Examinations. It was decided to hold Entrance Examinations this August in four different places, namely, Chungking, Kunming, Kweiyang and Hongkong. All affiliated Middle Schools are being notified of the temporary regulations concerning admission to the College and of the special examinations for their students.

CO-OPERATION WITH CANTON UNION THEOLOGICAL COLLEGE

The Canton Union Theological College which has just moved into Hsichow has entered into an agreement with Hua Chung College by which the two institutions are to cooperate in all academic life and work. At the first College Assembly, the President officially welcomed the Theological College on behalf of Hua Chung.

FACULTY CHRISTIAN FELLOWSHIP

The Faculty Christian Fellowship met last evening at the home of Mr. and Mrs. D. F. Anderson. The program for this term was discussed. It was decided that the Fellowship should meet fortnightly, and a Committee was appointed to arrange the topics for discussion and speakers. The Fellowship meeting closed with a short prayer led by Mr. Anderson.

STUDENT ACTIVITIES

"Ts'ang Hai" is the name of a literary paper started by a group of students whose interest in writing prose and poetry has been inspired by the grandness and beauty of "Tien Ts'ang" Mountains and "Er Hai." Since there is no printer in Hsichow, the paper is put out in handwriting and posted at the entrance to the college building. Contributions of a literary character are welcome.

COLLEGE SENATE MEETS

The College Senate met Saturday morning. The report of the Senate Committee on Cooperation with the Canton Union Theological College was adopted as follows:

- 1) The Seminary students shall live in the College hostels, sharing the life of the hostels and coming under the same discipline as the College students.
- 2) The Seminary classes may be held in the College class-rooms at such time as class-rooms are vacant.
- 3) As the College has been enabled to remove to Hsichow through the gifts of friends in the U.S.A. and England, no special charge shall be made for the use by the Seminary of class-rooms, hostels or other buildings provided by the Emergency Fund.
- 4) Seminary students shall be asked to pay the same fees as the College students with the exception of tuition. This payment shall entitle the Seminary students to the same privileges as the College students receive. The fees are as follows:-

Incidentals	15
Board	N\$7 per month.

5) Seminary students who have the necessary pre-requisites may take courses in the College and similarly, with College students in the Seminary. In each case a fee of \$1.50 (Chinese national currency) shall be charged for every credit hour.

6) Students of the one institution may take courses in the other only by express permission of the authorities of their own institution.

7) Teachers of either institution may be asked to offer special courses for the other institution, with the permission of the authorities concerned. Fees for such courses shall be charged at the same rate as given above.

8) Seminary students wishing to receive credit towards fulfilling Hua Chung degree requirements shall be required to pass the Hua Chung entrance examination and vice versa. Further details shall be worked out jointly by the Faculties of the two institutions.

Dean P'u Hwang, writing to Dr. Wei under date of April 28 from Berlin, en route to his part of Sailing, say: I will sail for Hongkong from Brindisi on May 11 by S.S. Cont Verdi. Most likely I will reach Hongkong on June 2, if no war breaks out before that time. In Hongkong I will stay a few days, then I will come directly to Kunming. I will let you know when I arrive at Hongkong. With kind regards to you and to all colleagues.

NEWS FROM MR. CHARLES HIGGINS

Excerpts from a letter dated May 17 from the Rev. Charles Higgins in Kweilin: The first trip to Kweiyang was accomplished in eight days. Hwang and I arrived here yesterday afternoon, having made the return trip in three and one-half days. Edouard remained in Kweiyang in order to help out the Red Cross who were in the predicament of having two trucks but only one driver. I felt that if Ed remained on that end we could expect more expedient transfer of our equipment between Kweiyang and Kunming. Ed signified his willingness to take on the new job and Hwang will drive with me on the Kweilin-Kweiyang run. If we have no delays we should be able to get all of the equipment out of Kweilin before the 30th of June, the date for the expiration of our license.

Your note concerning the articles most urgently needed in Hsichow arrived this morning in time for these things to be loaded on the trucks for the next shipment. The treasurer's box (asked for by Mr. Tan) was transported on the last trip. Mr. Shao is not clear about what boxes are required for the Chinese Dept. but he is making a search for them. The box of English Dept. books (No. 73) will be taken to Kweiyang on the next trip.

We plan to leave Kweiling to-morrow (May 18) afternoon at four o'clock. We find that we have better luck with the ferries if we in the later afternoon instead of the early morning. On the last trip (after an early start) we spent the best ten hours of one day at one of the ferries between Ta T'ang and Ho Sz. Our trip might have been completed in seven days if there had not been this delay.

I am continually being pestered by people who want to use the college trucks in various and sundry ways and I suppose I am making quite a few enemies because I have refused to grant any favors. ... I have removed the rear seat from my cab, built a box around the gasoline tank, and now carry nearly a half ton of small boxes inside the cab. On the last trip we packed the bodies as high as the iron bars that support the canvas would allow. This left us no place to sleep and it was necessary for Ed and I to use the hotels while Hwang and Liu Si-fu slept in the front seats and guarded the trucks. It is difficult to estimate the amount of stuff we still have here but

I believe we shall have a hard time crowding it all into five more trips.

While I was away on the last trip Mr. Shao had all of the things from the Hospitality House moved over to the college building and he fixed rooms for Ed and I in the physics labs. I am still having my meals with Miss Ford and that is a great pleasure. Everything here is fine. Shao and the three servants remaining here seem to be looking after things rather well. I hear no complaints from the Baptists. Shao is certainly working hard and never refuses to do a single thing I ask. I am carrying the Ministry of Education pass but no one ever asks for it. I have had some new cards printed and use them mostly in place of our various passes.

"ER HAI ECHO"

The English Club has started a paper called "Er Hai Echo". The first issue appeared last week and included articles by members of the Club. We wish the success of the first "Echo" will be repeated over the waves of Er Hai!

A very successful Fellowship meeting was held Friday evening at the home of Dr. and Mrs. T. G. Djang. Mr. Ts'ai Yung-ch'un led an interesting discussion on "Why Christian Higher Education." On account of Mrs. Lo's illness, the meeting was not held in Dr. Lo's apartment as originally announced.

Mr. Anderson, Dr. Kunkle and Dr. Lo are meeting soon to decide upon the topic and speaker for the next Fellowship.

CONFERENCE ON "CHRISTIANITY AND COMMUNISM"

About fifteen students and six faculty members were present at the "Round Table Conference" last Sunday morning. Mr. John B. Foster who had been with the Chinese 8th Route Army six months last year told of his experiences and impressions and pointed out the points of difference between Communism and Christianity. Among those who took an active part in the discussion were President Wei, Dr. T. W. Zee, Mr. Anderson, and Dr. B. K. Chen.

LETTER FROM BISHOP GILMAN

Regular mails seem to be open again between Wuhan and the College. A letter from Bishop Gilman dated May 10 was received during the last week. It contains personal news only. We are glad to hear from the Bishop again.

NEWS FROM MR. JOHN L. COE

Writing to Dr. Wei under date April 3 via Shanghai Mr. Coe says: There is no telling how the situation here may develop during the next few months and I shall continue to do my best to see that the interests of the college do not suffer. I have recently had a number of small trees planted on the city wall land and hope that some of them at least will grow. These have cost me nothing more than a couple of days labor for two men to set them out.

We still have nearly a thousand refugees here on the compound and it looks as though they would be here for some time to come. They are concentrated mainly in the Middle School Buildings, Poyu Hostel and St. Paul's Hostel. The refugee committee for this city is starting this week an industrial training school for refugees here. There are about a hundred and fifty in it, half men and half women. The women are to live in the old Yen Hostel and the men in Ingle Hall. One section of the work is in farming and they are going to use the cultivated land between the moat and the grave land. The masons section of the school I am going to try and persuade to do practical work at patching portions of the compound wall and other things of that kind.

Bergamini got away the middle of last week on furlough and will probably be leaving Shanghai very soon with his family for the States.

I hope that the college will be able to carry through the move to Hsichow without too much difficulty and that it will be well settled there. You certainly deserve a great deal of credit for the way in which you have carried the college through so far and I hope that it will be able to settle down there and continue with its usual high standard of excellent way in which things have been carried on.

I am resident in Wuchang practically all of the time now and my wife gets over for the weekends and once in the middle of the week as she is kept fairly busy in Hankow acting as Secretary for both the Red Cross and for Bishop Gilman.

NEW FACULTY MEMBERS. In addition to the list of new members joining the faculty this year, Mr. F.S. Chen and Mr. M.C. Fu should be mentioned. The former has joined the department of Biology, while the latter is expected to arrive any day to join the department of Chinese.

NEW STUDENTS. Applications from students who wish to enter this college are still pouring in, though the Admissions Committee has already decided not to admit any more students. However, students recommended by the principals of the affiliated schools can still come. After the batch of new students who will come back with Mr. Eugene Hsu have finished their registration, no new students of whatever category may be admitted.

INTERMITTENT RAIN. On account of the heavy rainfall, the highway between Kunming and Hsiakwan is interrupted. Consequently, neither newspapers nor mails have been able to arrive at the college for the past fortnight. The Administrative Committee has already wired Messrs. Eugene Hsu and T.L. Shao, who are away from the college on business, to come back as early as possible.

SENATE MEETING. The Senate meeting will be held on October 9, at 4 P.M.

GENERAL FACULTY MEETING. The general faculty meeting was held on Monday, October 8, at 4 P.M., presided over by Dr. T.G. Djang, chairman of the faculty. Problems concerning admission, the grading system and the intermediate examinations were discussed. A special faculty meeting was called today to consider the recommendations made by the School of Science concerning the requirement of philosophy for the students of that school.

CONFUCIUS' BIRTHDAY. Confucius' birthday will be observed according to the Lunar Calendar in this town, a date which falls on October the ninth. Messrs. Fao, Lin, Yu of the Department of Chinese and Mr. Ma of the Department of History-Sociology were asked to represent the Faculty to join the local gentry in their celebration. During the occasion, the college library, which happens to be the Temple of Confucius, will be closed.

THE DOUBLE TENTH. A committee composed of Dr. Hwang, Mr. Ma, Dr. Zee and three students representing the three hostels was formed to plan the celebration of October tenth, the anniversary of the founding of the Republic of China.

PRACTICE TEACHING IN HSICHOW. One of the difficulties of the Department of Education since coming to Hsichow has been the lack of practice teaching facilities for the students of the Junior and Senior years. This difficulty has now been solved through the kind cooperation of Mr. Yang Po-lun, the Principal of the newly opened Hsichow middle school. Mr. Yang has welcomed the assistance of Hua Chung students teaching under supervision to help to staff his school, and twelve of our students are now responsible for teaching more than forty hours per week in the Wu T'ai Middle School. Ten students are receiving credit as well as part-time ~~wage~~ salary for their work, which is under the supervision of Mr. Anderson, assisted by Mr. Wu Tsai-hsing. Two other students are teaching music under the supervision of Miss Zenk. According to the agreement between the School of Education and the Wu T'ai Middle School, the Department of Education takes full responsibility for all the English teaching in the school, which is under the able direction of Mr. Wu Tsai-hsing. With the assistance of two students Mr. Wu has

established the English teaching on modern Direct Method lines, which has aroused considerable interest and has led directly to requests from other groups for our assistance in this direction.

INDUSTRIAL COOPERATIVE IN HSICHOW. On October 3, an industrial cooperative was opened in Hsiichow under the auspices of the Chinese Industrial Cooperatives, the national headquarters of which are in Chungking. Provincial headquarters are located in Kuming and there is a branch office in Tali, located just to the east of the magistrate's office, which has in the past two months organized nine industrial cooperatives in this valley. The Hsiichow cooperative is a cloth-dyeing one and is located just outside the east gate near the old men's hostel. Several members of the Hua Chung teaching staff attended the preliminary organization meeting of this cooperative, which is being partly financed by friends of the cooperative movement in this college. It is hoped that we, as a college, will be able to extend further help to this young movement, which is attracting increasingly widespread attention in America and in those parts of China more directly affected by the war.

VOLLEYBALL MATCH. A game was played between the men students of the new hostel and those of the old in the afternoon of October 2. It was refereed by Dr. I. Fu, and the victory went to the new hostel, 2-1.

GLEE CLUB. At its first meeting of the new year the Glee Club was reorganized last night under the direction of the Director, David Anderson, and held its first practice of the year. Students or staff members are welcome to join.

SECOND SCIENCE FORUM. The Second Science Forum will be held this evening at 8 P.M. in Dean T.W. Zee's residence. Mr. W.P. Chu will speak on the subject of Some Perplexing Atmospheric Phenomena.

FACULTY CHRISTIAN FELLOWSHIP. The second meeting of the Faculty Christian Fellowship will be held on Sunday, October 8, at 7:30 P.M. in Mr. David Anderson's residence. Mr. Anderson will speak on the subject of worship.

EDUCATION CLUB. A meeting of the Education Club, which is one of the oldest clubs on this campus, was held on Saturday night, September 30, and attended by about 30 members. Its purpose was to welcome a new teacher, Miss Zenk, Dr. P. Hwang, who has just come back from Europe and America, some old members who have returned to this college and also members who have newly joined this club. An interesting talk was given by Dr. Hwang, which was then followed by a social. On Saturday afternoon, October 14, Dr. Hwang will address the second meeting of the club on The Nine Famous Public Schools of England. It is also planned to have a debate later this term. Anyone is welcome to take part.

BIOLOGY CLUB. A club meeting took place on Friday night, September 29, which was in the nature of a social. Mr. P.S. Chen, who had just joined the staff of the Biology Department, and some new members of this club were introduced at this meeting. Then games were played.

CHINESE CLUB. A Chinese club is now in the making, and sanction from the college authorities is being awaited. Beyond any doubt, such an organization will be encouraged.

RADIO CLUB. One of the projects of the Radio Club, under the leadership of Yang Yo-han, is the receiving and posting of radio news day by day. About 30 students have volunteered to take the news in relay while members of the Radio Club are helping to adjust the receivers. Now the news come from the national broadcasting station at Kuming, but the service will be extended to include international news from Manila and London when the electric light is installed and the larger radio set can be used. The Chinese news is being translated daily into English by the Hua Chung News Agency, a project of the English Club.

ENGLISH CLUB. There will be a regular bi-weekly meeting of the English Club this evening in the English Department office. All advisers are urged to attend.

THE LATE MR. WANG'S BURLAL. The body of Mr. Wang Sheng-yu was buried near the Dog Market on the morning of Oct. 3. Many teachers and students attended the ceremony to pay their last respects.

SHANG KWAN FAIR. After days of incessant rain, the sun began to smile on October 5. In great joy hosts of teachers and students went to the Shang Kwan fair at the head of the lake, either on horse back, by boat or by foot. The biggest fair in this area, it was somewhat smaller than usual because of the abnormal amounts of rain. Those who went came back with large quantities of commodities.

THE POWER PLANT. Dr. David Hsiung has made two trips to Kuming for the power plant. On his first trip he bought electric bulbs, wire etc. for the college and made a thorough investigation for a gas producer. On his second trip he took the trouble to get a gas producer and the college bus to our campus. Now he is very busy in supervising the installation of the power plant. Beginning from the Double Tenth the campus will be properly lighted in the evenings. He certainly has rendered a great service to the college.

PERSONAL NOTES. Dr. T.G. Djang is becoming more and more interested in the raising of chickens. So far, seventeen eggs have been laid by his nine hens. Celebrated biologists of this college thought that they might belong to the pure lag-horn specie. The cock fighting is thoroughly enjoyable and exciting, too.

Dr. R.P. Bien has invented a new kind of tobacco, made of native tobacco leaves, honey and alcohol, though the percentage of each is still kept a secret. If patented, it may become a keen competitor to Prince Albert.

Dr. S.W. Wan has been released from a six weeks' quarantine which was made necessary by the fact that his baby was suffering from scarletina. Now the little baby is entirely recovered.

REQUEST. The librarian wishes to announce that any faculty member who has an interesting book which he would like to share with the rest of the Hua Chung staff may do so by loaning the book to the library. Such books will be placed on a special shelf behind the loan desk and will circulate for the period of one week. Needless to say, good care will be taken of all loans. A number of books have already been received from generous faculty members and will be circulated as soon as the carpenters have finished the shelf.

Inasmuch as this course in philosophy is a general college requirement, it was recommended that it should be required for all science students but the questions of credits might be suspended pending the decision of the Ministry of Education.

DEATH OF MR. CHIU CHEN*YU. Word has been received here that Mr. Chiu Chen-yu, a member of last year's freshman class, was fatally injured in a bus accident recently between Kunming and Kweiyang.

P'ao of the Department of Chinese Literature will speak on this occasion. Professor P'ao has been elected to give the matriculation address to the freshman class.

KUNMING OFFICE. Owing to the increasing volume of business in the Kunming office, Mr. Wan Hsien-fa has been deprived of a large part of his time and energy. Since his main duty is to assist Professor Y. C. P'ao in doing research work, the Senate decided upon a set of regulations governing the working conditions of the Kunming office: 1. The Kunming office is not going to handle private business for members of the faculty, staff or student body. 2. Any order for purchasing articles needed by the different departments and offices should be sent through the Acting Treasurer's office, and not directly to the Kunming office, which has been instructed not to execute this kind of order. 3. Orders for purchasing articles are sent out from the Treasurer's office to Kunming at the beginning of each month. 4. No money should be sent directly to Kunming, but should be sent through the Treasurer's office instead, where accounts are kept with the Kunming office and cleared at the end of each month.

POWER PLANT. Mr. Edouard Taylor was appointed Superintendent of the Power Plant. While he is busy transporting the college equipment and books from Kunming to Hsichow, Dr. P. V. Taylor is acting in his stead.

COLLEGE GARDENS. Permission was given to the Theological Seminary to put proper fences around the college garden both in front and at the back of the Temple. Dr. Kunkle has accepted the position of superintendent of college gardens. If any group should desire to have any part of the gardens for its exclusive use for some legitimate purpose for a definite period of time, such a group must obtain permission from him.

KEROSENE. The college stock of kerosene is for sale at the price of forty dollars (N.C.) per tin. Only members of the faculties of the college and Theological Seminary, and the different Hostels have the privilege to buy from the stock. Buyers must negotiate with the Acting Treasurer.

UNIVERSAL WEEK OF PRAYER. From January 7th to January 14th has been set as the Universal Week of Prayer, which is observed by Christians of all denominations all over the world. It seems well that we should realise our unity with the Church Universal by holding a series of meetings in the course of that week, following the topics set forth. As the College Chapel will be in use next week as an examination hall, it is proposed to hold the meetings in the Theological College Chapel on the Allen-Constantine compound, from 4.50 - 5.15 P. Writing from Hankow on December 14th, Mr. John Coe said in his letter to Dr. Wei, "My present hope is that as soon as Brown, the Bishop, and Kemp get here to take over some of the things which I have been doing, I shall get away for my furlough. But just how long before they will be here is still a question, though I hope soon. I would plan of seeing you as soon as possible, and within a month with you at most would be needed".

DR. KUNKLE. Dr. Kunkle expects to be away from Hsichow from January 10th to the beginning of the next term in February. During his absence Dr. Tai-king Taai will be in full charge of the Theological College.

WESLEY FELLOWSHIP. On Sunday, January 7th, the Annual Covenant Service of the Methodist Church, followed by Holy Communion, will be held in the Theological College at 9.15 A. M.

CHAPLAIN FOR THE ANGLICAN STUDENTS. A telegram has been received from Rev. Carl Liu in Wansien, a graduate of Hua Chung College and a clergyman in the Hankow Diocese of Chung Hua Sheng Kung Hwei, in reply to the President's letter accepting him as the Chaplain of the Anglican students of this College and urging him to come to Hsichow as soon as possible. He said that he would leave for Hsichow in two weeks' time. His telegram was dated December 20.

ALUMNI NEWS. Mr. Ma Sheng Kai of the Class of 1933 has written that he had left Szechwan University, now at O-mai-shan, and has been appointed Librarian of the Szechwan Agricultural Institute which is now in Chengtu.

Among letters of congratulations for the anniversaries of the College received from the Alumni, one was from Chu Chia Hu of the class of 1936 who had been transferred from Chang I in Kweichow to Chungking. He is still serving in the Training Bureau of Kuo-min-tang as lecturer and translator. He says that living expenses are very high in Chungking. Both water supply and communication are difficult.

On last Monday, Mr. and Mrs. Tsai gave a reception in his honour in their apartment and a group of the Faculty members had the pleasure of hearing Dr. Wu speak on Archaeological investigation.

PROFESSORS FROM LIEN-TA. Five Professors from the South-west Union University arrived in Hsichow on Thursday and stayed in the College through Friday leaving for Li-chiang on Saturday morning.

SUNDAY SERVICES. On account of the term examination, which takes place in the College Chapel, the Sunday Services on January 14 will be held in the Chapel of the Canton Union Theological College at 10:30 a.m. The Holy Communion, according to the order of Chung Hua Sheng Kung Hwei, will take place at 8 a.m. in the same Chapel.

DR. E. C. LOBENSTINE. Dr. E. C. Lobenstine, representing the Hua Chung Board of Founders, and Yale-in-China Association Board of Trustees, is paying a short visit to the College. He arrived from Kunming by a special car on Wednesday evening and stayed through Friday and left for Kunming early Saturday morning. On Thursday he spent a great part of his time with the President and Mr. J. I. Tan at the Treasurer's Office. On Friday he met with the Committee on the Combined Courses for the Theological students, which will be submitted to the Ministry of Education for approval, and had interviews with some of the Faculty members in the morning. In the afternoon he met the Faculty members of the Yale-in-China School of Sciences and addressed the Faculty members of both Hua Chung College and the Canton Union Theological College on the subject of world situation. The Rev. B. B. Chapman of the Methodist Mission, formerly in Wuchang and now in Kunming, accompanied Dr. Lobenstine in his visit to Hsichow. They were both impressed by the fortunate location of the College for its beautiful environment and its comparative security from war disturbances.

PROFESSOR DAVID S. HSIUNG. Professor Hsiung has gone to Kunming on College business. He is going to attend to some financial transactions there as well as to purchase equipment for the Physics Department and the Power Plant. He expects to be away from the College for the greater part of the vacation.

DEAN P'U HWANG AND PROFESSOR I. KU. Dean P'u Hwang and Professor I. Ku are going to Chungking during the vacation to interview some officials of the Ministry of Education as official delegates of the College.

MR. M. C. FU. Mr. M. C. Fu of the Department of Chinese Literature has also got permission to go to Tali next week, in order to study the languages of the local tribes as a part of the investigation undertaken by his Department on the support of the Yenching-Harvard Board in Cambridge, Massachusetts, U. S. A.

NEW HEAD FOR DEPARTMENT OF MUSIC. Dr. P. V. Taylor has resigned as Acting Head of the Department of Music. Miss Gertrude Zenk has been appointed to succeed him.

THE SOCIAL COMMITTEE. Mrs. Constantine, Mrs. P'u Hwang, Mrs. T. G. Djeng and Miss Zenk have been appointed members of the Social Committee.

WINTER VACATION. The Senate has taken action that for the Winter Vacation, the same rules governing the students will apply as during the last Summer Vacation. There will be no special courses during the Winter Vacation except that students taking Science courses will be given chances to take up laboratory work and that there may be special lectures and student activities to be arranged. The students will not be allowed to leave the College without written requests from their families.

MEN'S HOSTEL. Owing to the remodelling of the building by the Landlord at present occupied by the majority of men students, which may take some months to complete, the men students will have to move out from the Old Hostel during the Winter Vacation to a temple and three shop buildings in the Hsichow street, which will be loaned to us by the local gentry.

COMMITTEE ON SCHOLARSHIPS AND LOANS. The Committee on Scholarships and Loans has passed on the applications of more than half of the students, both men and women, for subsidies to meet the rising prices for food in the Hostels. The results will be communicated to the individual students concerned.

TERM EXAMINATION. The term examination is going on and would be finished on Jan. 17. Registration for next term will begin on February 20, and classes begin on 22.

PROFESSORS FROM LIEN-TA. Four Professors of the South-West Union University who expect to visit Li-kiang, north of the Ksichow town, will probably stop in our College and spend a few days with us.

MR. BAXTER AND MR. SHORT. Word has been received from Mr. Baxter and Mr. Short of the London Missionary Society that they will come to visit Ksichow, leaving Hongkong on January 20. They are expected to arrive some time during the first week of February unless they should fly.

LIBRARY HOURS. During the vacation, the small reading room of the College Library will be open from 9 to 12 a.m., except on Sundays, and the large building at the back, from 8:30 to 12:00 a.m., 1:30 to 5 p.m., and 7 to 9:30 p.m. if the Power Plant is functioning.

PLAN OF WAR PRICE ALLOCANCES:-

- a) In granting subsidy only the cost of food shall be considered.
- b) Subsidy shall be granted according to the size of the family.
- c) Faculty and staff members receiving a salary of \$150.00 or more per month shall not be subsidized.
- d) Faculty and staff members receiving a salary of \$100.00 to \$149.00 and having a family of three members or less including the wage earner shall not be considered.
- e) Faculty and staff members who are single and receive a salary of \$40.00 to \$99.00 per month shall not be considered.
- f) The subsidy shall be \$5.00 per capita per month in a family for persons receiving a monthly salary of less than \$100.00.
- g) For persons whose salary is from \$100.00 to \$149.00 per month and who have more than three members in the family including the wage earner, the extra members of the family shall be subsidized to the amount of \$5.00 per capita per month.
- h) The 'family' is defined to include only the wage earner, wife (or husband in case the wife is the wage earner), children and dependent parents now resident in Ksichow.
- i) Those persons who are temporarily employed shall not be benefited by this scheme.
- j) This scheme shall become effective from January 1940 to the end of July 1940. Her subsidy can be guaranteed after July 1940. When the local index figure (compiled by the Economics Dept.) falls to 200 all subsidies shall be halved and when it becomes 100 all subsidies shall be removed, in both cases the same shall apply to all.

Mr. Shao Tze-po, the Physical Director is spending his vacation in Kunming to learn more Chinese boxing. The Rev. and Mrs. G. F. Allen have gone to Kunming for dental treatment.

REV. & MRS. G. F. ALLEN. Dr. wei has just received a letter from the Rev. G. F. Allen in Kunming saying that on his way to Kunming from Lsiakwan his bus had a collision with a truck on a sharp corner about one hour after leaving Yunnanyi. Fortunately Mr. and Mrs. Allen escaped with no damage, but several of the other passengers received bad cuts. The bus was too badly damaged to go on, but the Allens got a lift on an army truck to Tsuyung, where they were met the next day by a rescue bus and got to Kunming on schedule. Mr. Allen also says that he and his wife expect to return to Hsichow on February 1st with Mr. Baxter and Mr. Short of the London Mission.

POWER PLANT. During the absence of the Taylors and Dr. David Hsiung from the College, Dr. Wesley Han is in charge of the Power Plant by request of the Senate and the School of Science.

ELEVEN FRESHMEN TRANSFERRED. Last week President wei had a solemn talk with four of the new students from Hongkong who had been much inclined to extravagance in their habits, quite contrary to Hua Chung traditions of simple living and high thinking. As a consequence of this talk, eleven of the new students from Hongkong sent a petition to the President saying that they could not submit to the limitations of simplicity of life and asked that they might be allowed to transfer to other institutions in order not to disturb the simple life in the College. The President interviewed each one of the eleven students and felt satisfied that the best thing would be for them to leave. The Registrar's Office has already circulated the names of the students to the Faculty members and Heads of the administrative departments.

PARLIAMENTARY RULES. Dr. wei is conducting a series of meetings for drill in Parliamentary Procedure. Over fifty students have signed up to attend. The meetings are on every Tuesday and Thursday morning 10.30 to 11.30 A. M.

MISS BLEAKLEY. We are happy to report that Miss Bleakley had practically recovered from her attack of influenza. For the past four or five days she has been able to ~~go~~ out in the sun for a short time and on Friday returned to her own home.

Rev. Alex Baxter and Rev. Frank Short. Rev. Alex Baxter, Secretary of the China Council of the London Missionary Society, and Rev. Frank Short, Secretary of the L. M. S. in Hongkong are due to arrive in Hsichow on February 1st. where they will be staying at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Anderson. A special meeting of the Faculty Christian Fellowship will be held on Friday evening at 7.30 at the Andersons' house to allow Faculty members to meet Mr. Baxter and Mr. Short. It is planned to have a discussion on some of the findings of the Madras Conference at which Mr. Baxter was a delegate.

DR. WU CHIN-TING. Dr. Wu Chin-ting of the Academia Sinica has been visiting in Hua Chung College as guest of Mr. and Mrs. Tsai Yung-chung. Dr. Wu is an archaeological investigator and has been stationed in Tali for over one year for his investigation which is very fruitful in results. He plans to move to Hsichow next month and spend some months for investigation in this district.

The President and the Treasurer are members *ex officio* with power to vote. In the absence of Prof. John L. Coe, Treasurer, Prof. David S. Hsiung acts as his proxy on the Executive Committee Pro-tem.

SENATE - NEW SENATE MEMBERS. Besides the members on the Senate who are *ex officio*, Prof. Richard Bien and Prof. John Lo have been elected Faculty representatives on the Senate. Professor David Anderson and the Assistant Professor L. Constantine have been appointed by the Executive Committee Pro-tem to represent the Board of Directors on the Senate.

GENERAL FACULTY MEETING. In the General Faculty Meeting held on last Monday, Dean P'u Hwang was unanimously elected Chairman of the Faculty Meeting.

NEW REGULATIONS FOR THE SUBSIDY OF THE FACULTY & STAFF MEMBERS AND THEIR FAMILIES A set of four new regulations has been drawn up by a Senate Committee, adopted by the Senate, and approved by the Executive Committee Pro-tem to take effect from August 1, 1940. They have been circularized to all the Chinese members of the Faculty and Staff.

NEW SEMESTER. Classes will begin on Monday September 23 according to the schedule which has been posted by the Registrar. Members of the Faculty are requested to note their lecture hours.

TRANSFERRED STUDENTS. Owing to the situation in French Indo-China and the possibility of students who desire to transfer at this particular time, the College has decided to admit more transferred students to the second and third years of the College, if they should be able to fulfill the College requirements. Advertisement has been put into the Kunming newspapers to this effect.

ECONOMICS CLUB. A tea party was given by Messrs Hu Ju-hwei and Wei Wen-kuang to welcome the new members of the Economics-Commerce Department on Tuesday, Sept. 17 at Mr. P. L. Tang's house. After the party, the Economics Club was organized. Officers elected are Mr. Wei Wen-kuang, Chairman, Mr. Hu Ju-hwei, Treasurer and Mr. Hwang Chao-min, Secretary. A public lecture under the auspices of the Club has been arranged for 4 p.m. Wednesday, Sept. 25. Mr. Z. S. Bien will speak on the Chinese Currency problems since the outbreak of the present Sino-Japanese war. Mr. Bien, the father of Professor Bien, besides being one of the directors of the Bank of China and its manager in the Tientsin Branch, is holding many important positions in both the financial and industrial circles.

AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE HSICHOW GENERAL HOSPITAL AND HUA CHUNG COLLEGE FOR COOPERATION IN MEDICAL WORK.

- (1) This agreement is entered into between the Hsichow General Hospital, Hsichow, and Hua Chung College for medical work to benefit both parties.
- (2) Dr. Logan H. Roots, College Physician of Hua Chung College, will undertake the surgical work in the Hsichow General Hospital three times a week from 1:30 to 4:30 in the afternoon.
- (3) Hours for Dr. Roots' operations will be agreed upon in consultation between the Hsichow General Hospital and Dr. Roots.
- (4) At the request of Dr. Roots or of the Hsichow General Hospital, Dr. Roots and the doctors of the Hospital may consult each other or respond to calls of outpatients, but as far as possible such calls should not interfere with the clinic hours in the Hsichow General Hospital.
- (5) Dr. Roots may have the use of the laboratories in the Hsichow General Hospital for purposes of diagnosis. For such general examinations as urine, stool, or blood there will be no charge, but chemicals or drugs used for special examinations will be charged at cost.
- (6) At Dr. Roots' request the Hsichow General Hospital will send to the Hua Chung College Infirmary a nurse in the morning to assist Dr. Roots in his Infirmary clinic, limited to three ~~XXXXXX~~ times a week. The hours should not interfere with the clinic hours in the Hsichow General Hospital.
- (7) Members of the faculty and administrative staff and students of Hua Chung College will receive outpatient treatments during the hospital clinic hours in the Hsichow General Hospital, at Dr. Roots' written request, free of charge. Calls at the Hsichow General Hospital outside the clinic hours will be charged according to the Hospital Regulations.
- (8) At Dr. Roots' request patients from Hua Chung College will be received into the Hsichow General Hospital wards at the rate of NC\$2,50 a day in the third-class wards, and with a 30% discount on the Hsichow General Hospital, ~~standard rates in the second or first-class wards.~~
- (9) Patients from Hua Chung College will not be charged for any operation or delivery in obstetrical cases in the Hsichow General Hospital, except for medicines actually used.
- (10) Whenever the terms "Hua Chung College patients" or "Members of the faculty and administrative staff and students" are used in this agreement they refer to members of the faculty and administrative staff, students, servants, and the families of the members of the faculty and administrative staff (including wives, parents, children, and servants) of both Hua Ch

College and the Union Theological College, as certified by Dr. Roots.

(11) There will be no charge for whatever obligations are fulfilled by the one party to the other, as stipulated in the above articles, unless it is otherwise explicitly stated.

(12) This agreement will be enforced for one year from June 1, 1941. Its continuation or revision may be effected by mutual agreement, but if during the period of the agreement either Dr. Cheng Hsin Chen of the Hsichow General Hospital or Dr. Logan H. Roots of Hua Chung College should leave his post, the agreement would become null and void.

DR. ROOTS ASKS ALL CONCERNED TO OBSERVE THE FOLLOWING:

- (1) Dr. Roots will see patients in clinics at the Infirmary: 10 - 12 A.M. Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, and at other hours by appointment.
- (2) He can be seen at the Hospital clinic only by previous appointment.
- (3) Hsichow Hospital cannot give free registration without a note from Roots.
- (4) Dr. Roots will answer outcalls for emergency cases as before.
- (5) The College will pay for any prescription or bill countersigned by Dr. Roots and according to College Regulations. Otherwise it cannot be held responsible for expenses incurred.
- (6) Dr. Roots can always be reached at his house before 7 A.M.

HUA CHUNG ON THE MARCH

Wuchang to Kweilin

When the Standing Committee of the College Board of Directors made the final decision on July 1, 1938, to move Hua Chung to Kweilin as a measure of safety, a committee of three, consisting of Dr. Paul C. T. Kwei, Dr. B. K. Chen, and Mr. Shao, the Physical Director, was appointed to take charge of the caravan, while Mr. Coe was asked to remain in Wuchang to look after the college property. After days of negotiation for transportation, the College Moving Committee secured the loan of one launch and one tug-boat from the War-time Service Corps of the Military Affairs Commission. A junk was also hired to carry the college equipment. With all the necessary arrangements completed, the Hua Chung caravan decided to take off for Kweilin on July 10th.

Notices had been sent to our students announcing the college plans, and advising them of the opportunity to join the college caravan. By 5 P. M., on July 10th, over forty Hua Chung students living in Wuhan reported at the college for registration to join the group. Members of the faculty and their families numbered over fifty. The whole caravan left the Wuchang campus at 8 o'clock in the evening to get on board the specially chartered boats.

Few slept well the first night on the boat, because of the disturbing noises of moving baggage and heavy equipment. Many students' parents, relations and friends gathered at the bund to give parting advice and to say farewell. Next morning, at half past ten, the last whistle was blown, and the great migration started on its way.

STUDENTS ORGANIZE

An informal religious meeting was called by the faculty members the first evening. Soon a students' Religious Committee was organized to take charge of morning prayers, which were held daily. The same Religious Committee later also functioned as a Recreation Committee. The recreation consisted of a sunset meeting everyday in which all participated. From professors to college servants, all made their contributions for entertainment by singing local airs, telling jokes, or acting funny roles. These sunset meetings were thoroughly enjoyed, and all members of the caravan felt that they were really members of one big family.

STORMY WEATHER

From the start of the journey we encountered a strong wind, which so shook our little boats that not a few fell seasick. The current being strong, we made slow progress, anchoring at Ta Chu the first night. Before we went to bed, Mr. Shao called the roll, and roll call was later taken every night before bedtime. The next night we spent at Pao Ta Chow. Not until the midnight of the 13th did we get to Yochow. As the wind was becoming worse, we were forced to stay at Yochow one day, and everybody took the opportunity to go on land and enjoy the sights. From the Yoyang Tower one could get a whole view of the city and its environs, including the Tungting lake.

CHANGSHA

We left Yochow early in the morning of July 15th. The Tungting lake was peaceful and calm, and the launch made such good speed that we reached Changsha about eleven o'clock that night. Two of our students who fell sick on the way were immediately sent to the Hunan-Yale hospital, but the rest of the caravan did not land until the next morning when we moved into Yali Middle School. The school authorities treated us with great hospitality. Here we stayed seven days in relative ease and comfort. The students' Commissary Committee continued their function; and the morning prayers and sunset meetings were held everyday.

At Changsha our caravan was increased by the addition of over twenty Hua Chung students in Hunan province, both men and women, who desired to go to Kweilin with the college.

EQUIPMENT AND BAGGAGE TRANSPORT

It was our original plan for the whole caravan to go by boat directly to Hengyang. But due to the sudden fall of the Siang river, and the danger of being grounded, the College Moving Committee decided to send only the baggage, including the college equipment, by river, and to let the caravan go by train. So on July 20th, the baggage division, under the direction of Mr. Shao, departed for Siangtan. At Siangtan, because the river was still falling, a smaller launch was engaged to take the place of the larger one. But before long, even the smaller one had to be given up, and the baggage division had to depend entirely on junks. At several places, trackers were used to pull the boats; and many of our students, encouraged by the Physical Director, volunteered to help. The baggage division finally arrived at Hengyang on July 30th, after being caught in heavy rain several times, causing some damage to the property.

BY TRAIN TO HENGYANG

The main body of the caravan waited in Changsha seven days before we could get a train to take us to Hengyang. During the week, nine air-raid alarms were sounded, although most of the times the enemy planes did not succeed in getting into the city. But on July 22nd, the day of our departure, Japanese planes got into the city and dropped some bombs near the North Station. At 6 P.M., that day, we crowded into a dirty and broken car specially reserved for us. Because our train had to wait for the passage of military trains, our start was delayed nine hours, which seemed like a tormenting experience. When finally the train pulled out of the station at 3 o'clock in the morning, we felt unspeakably happy! On the way, we had one more interesting and exciting experience of an air-raid alarm. We all had to get off the train to hide ourselves in the bushes. The locomotive was detached and went off down the track. It was only when we saw that the locomotive was returning to the train that we left our cover and returned to our car. The rest of the journey was uneventful, and we got into Hengyang at ten o'clock in the evening of July 23rd.

HENGYANG

As soon as we arrived at Hengyang station, we sent a vanguard to Hwei Wen Girls' Primary School to make preparations for taking in the caravan. The principal of the school was roused from her sleep, and the only servant in the school was kept busy making tea and getting kerosene for oil lamps. Before the rooms were ready for occupation, the caravan had reached the school gate, and soon it was all noise and confusion! Hwei Wen is a small

Christian school which ordinarily houses not more than seventy or eighty day pupils. The place was obviously too small for our large group, but we managed to crowd into two class-rooms; and, because there were not enough beds, many slept on the floor, with a mat as the only piece of bedding.

We stayed 23 days at Hengyang, much longer than we expected. As there were no servants in the school, we organized ourselves into a service corps and kept the place as tidy and clean as we could manage to do. Everybody shared in the manual labor, including professors. The lack of water supply was a great problem which kept the Commissary Committee busy. Although there were three large and deep wells in the school compound, they were all dried up.

We gave two entertainments while we were at Hengyang, one of which was in honor of Mr. Hou, director of the Hunan-Kwangsi railway. Mr. Hou is a former school-mate of Dr. Kwei, and it was through his help that we secured passage to Tungan and Chuenchow. The other entertainment was given in honor of the baggage and equipment division, which reached Hengyang on July 30th, after much hardship on the way. We also had one special lecture given by one Mr. Wang of the Central Airplane Manufactory; and twice we were entertained by the Wartime Service Corps of Hengyang. Besides these functions, our students in small groups made several sight-seeing trips to the scenic spots of Hengyang and vicinity. Some of our musical talents organized themselves into a choir and participated in several church services.

AN UNHAPPY DAY AT TUNGAN

A heavy downpour on August 1st and 2nd so damaged the railway bridge at Tungan that through passage to Chuenchow was impossible. We waited for the bridge to be repaired, but when it became clear that the repair could not be completed very soon, we decided to go to Tungan first. The caravan was again divided into two groups, the baggage and equipment division leaving for Tungan on August 12, and the main body of people on August 15th. Mr. Shao, arriving at Tungan on August 13th, rented a newly built hotel for the use of the caravan which arrived on the 16th. But we discovered at once that Tungan was not a place for us to stay long, for there was an epidemic, and dependable food was particularly difficult to obtain. Dr. Kwei and Dr. Chen immediately got in touch with Mr. Hou, director of the railway, requesting him to help us to get out of Tungan as soon as possible. The next morning we boarded a freight car, loaded with rails, for Chuenchow. It was a hot day, and the car had no cover. Water being scarce, drinking had to be regulated so that every two or three hours one could only get one cupful of water. That was probably one of the worst experience during our journey.

FIRST STOP AT KWANGSI

But when we arrived at Chuenchow at 9 P.M., August 17th, we felt a great relief. The head of the railway section and his family were at the station to receive us. Six buses had been placed at our disposal to take us to the provincial junior middle school. We found that Chuenchow is a much cleaner and more prosperous city than Tungan.


DESTINATION

From Chuenchow to Kweilin we had to travel by motor cars. Due to the scarcity of buses, we couldn't all go at once. But by the 23rd of August, the caravan that left Wuchang on July 11th, with the exception of a few in charge of baggage transport, had all reached the destination.

Almost everyone who took part in the trek from Wuchang to Kweilin testified to the fine leadership of those in charge, and the spirit of service and co-operation among all members of the group. The trip had not been a wholly pleasant one, but no one complained about anything, knowing the difficulties under which we had to move. In this college moving enterprise, both teachers and students did their share, and all realized more than ever before that the Hua Chung community is one family in which there is no distinction of class or rank when emergency calls for special service.

The Hua Chung community which now settles at Kweilin will bring the same spirit to the new environment. We may have lost much in material goods, but the college spirit will grow and prosper.

HUA CHUNG SETTLES AT KWEILIN

NEW COLLEGE SITE

B The city of Kweilin, the temporary home of Hua Chung College, is the provincial capitol of Kwangsi. Kweilin is traditionally famous for its "hills and water". There are no less than seventeen hills in and around the city. Many of the hills stand isolated like croquettes on a platter, with large caves at the bottom which are used as dug-outs during air-raids. The city is rectangular in shape, and the longest distance, from north to south, is about ~~three kilometers~~. On the east side is the Kwei river which connects the capital by small river boats with Kwangsi's harbor, Wuchow.

By agreement with the Southern Baptist Mission at Kweilin, the college obtained permission to use a part of the Baptist property, consisting mainly of a three-story building with an attic. The building is just large enough to accommodate administrative offices, laboratories, and some class-rooms. The Baptist mission compound is on the west side of the city of Kweilin, bordering the city-wall. It is only a few minutes' walk from the center of the city.

HOSTELS

Several big Chinese houses have been rented as hostels. We expect to operate about three hostels for men, and one or two for women. At present, our girls are staying at the Sheng Kung Hui school for girls, under the unofficial care of Miss Tobin, and the newly appointed assistant-warden, Miss Chen. One of the men's hostels is a newly constructed house built by the college on the premises of the Christian and Missionary Alliance where about seventy boys may be comfortably placed.

PRESIDENT'S RETURN

After a year's leave, President Wei rejoined the college at Kweilin on August 25th. A reception was given in his honor by the faculty and students in the evening of August 29th in the men's hostel. Speeches of welcome were made by Dr. Bien, representing the faculty, and Miss Li Hsieh-yin, representing the student body. Among the guests present were Mr. Herring and Dr. Mewshaw of the Southern Baptist Mission, and the well-known Chinese artist, Mr. Feng Tze-kai.

KWANGSI OFFICIALS ENTERTAINED BY COLLEGE

The college Senate entertained the Kwangsi Provincial Government officials at a dinner on September 4th. The chairman of the provincial government was present, and many other important civil and military leaders. ~~We are happy to report that the college is on the best of friendly relations with the local officials.~~ *Σ*

SENATE AND FACULTY MEETINGS

Before President Wei's arrival at Kweilin, the temporary Senate, consisting of faculty members of professorial rank, had already begun meeting daily to discuss college business. These meetings continued for a while after the president's return; but since the beginning of Sept., Senate meetings have been held three times a week, on Monday, Wednesday and Friday mornings.

The first meeting of Hua Chung faculty at Kweilin was held on September 1st, 1938, in a mat-shed in the Baptist Mission compound. Sixteen members were present. Since then, weekly meetings have been held on Monday mornings.

^{B1} A few members of the faculty ^{were} ~~may~~ not be able to join the college at Kweilin when the college opens on October 1st. Mr. John Foster of the English Department ~~has~~ asked for one year's leave of absence in order to help in medical service in north-west China. Mr. Pillow is doing work among refugees in Wuhan, and is very much in need there. Both Miss Bleakley and Mrs. Miller are still in Kuling, and may not be able to leave that place for sometime.

We are glad, however, that Mr. and Mrs. D. F. Anderson will be with us toward the end of this month. Mr. White of the Department of Music safely arrived at Kweilin on September 21st after an adventurous trip from Kuling to Nanchang.

^{B2} Almost all Chinese members of the faculty have arrived at Kweilin. ^Σ Dr. Wan of the Department of Chemistry, and Dr. Fan of the Department of Sociology, are expected here before college opens.

ENTRANCE EXAMINATIONS

The first College Entrance Examinations were given on September 8th in Kweilin, and on September 15th in Hongkong and Hankow. Altogether 131 candidates took the examinations in the three places. Out of this number 25 were admitted. The results of the Changsha examinations are not yet known. The second Entrance Examinations will be given in Kweilin only, on September 30th. It is estimated that this year the college will have about eighty new freshmen.

NEW CHINESE MONTHLY

Under the supervision of the Publicity Committee, a group of students has started a Chinese monthly, named Hua Ta Kwei Sheng (meaning "the voice of Hua Chung in Kweilin"). The first issue appears on Oct. 1st. The monthly will carry college news for Chinese readers, as the Hua Chung News does for English readers.

AIR-RAID DEFENSE

^BSince our arrival at Kweilin, we have already experienced five air-raid alarms, though none of the times did the Japanese planes succeed in getting into the city. To give as much protection as possible to our students and faculty and staff members, as well as their families, the college is constructing a dug-out near the rented college building. The dug-out will be large enough to accommodate about 250 people. ^Σ

PRE-SESSION ACTIVITIES

Public lectures. For the benefit of the students during the period before regular college work starts, special lectures are given weekly by prominent speakers. Already the following distinguished persons have spoken to our students:

- Sept. 3, Mr. Pai Peng-fei, president of the University of Kwangsi.
- Sept. 10, Dr. Ma Chuin-wu, formerly president of Kwangsi University.
- Sept. 17, Mr. Chang Chuin-mai, formerly professor of philosophy of Yenching University.
- Sept. 24, Mr. Lay Ping-nan, formerly Commissioner of Education of Kwangsi Province.

Beside these general lectures, special departmental lectures are also given from time to time by outside lecturers.

Departmental Conferences. On Tuesdays and Thursdays, many departments have conferences with their own students. These conferences are of the nature of group discussion about some central topic.

Fellowship meeting. A faculty-student social gathering was held on September 17th, from 7 to 9 o'clock in the evening, on the third floor of the college building. Among the items of entertainment was a comic opera given by a group of women students which was thoroughly enjoyed.

Religious services. ^BA special college service was planned on Sunday morning, September 25th, at St. John's Church, but due to an air-raid alarm, the service had to be postponed. Morning prayers are held every morning, Monday to Friday, in Chung San Park. ^Σ

A SKETCH OF THE GIRLS' DORMITORY LIFE

(The following paragraphs were contributed to the HUA CHUNG NEWS by Miss Tang Wan-yung, a junior in the English department.)

Our dormitory is situated in Fen Pei Road. It is lent from I Hsun T'ang of the Anglican Church. There are only two big rooms and one little room for us to sleep in. The two big rooms are used for seniors and juniors, and the other for sophomore and freshman students. The little room is situated between the two big ones and is used as a little library - we have a desk in this room and put many kinds of books and magazines on it, and the Kwangsi daily newspaper is pinned on the wall.

Surely, we cannot compare our dormitory with Yen Hostel in Wuchang. We can never overtake Yen Hostel in material comforts with this dormitory, but we have our originally existing spirit. We all know that in this extraordinary time we should not press for comfort in everything but should be satisfied with what is necessary. Therefore we live happily together as we did in Wuchang.

Every morning we get up at six o'clock and take breakfast at half-past seven. After breakfast we have morning prayers at Chung San Park, and after we have finished these necessary things we may do what we like. Some girls go to the library, some sew their dresses and some knit their sweaters or waistcoats.

Many of us like to take a nap after lunch, but some girls continue to do their work.

When the sun has gone and the darkness is spreading its large cloak to cover the earth, we have our supper. We have no electric light in our bedroom, and each room has only one kerosene lamp. It is very sad that we can not see anything if we are at a distance of one foot from the lamp. Therefore we cannot help but go out; the public library is a good place for us in the evening.

When the clock strikes ten our bedrooms are full of girls. We lie down, each on our own bed, and talk about what we have seen in the day and anything that is new to us. Some girls, whom we used to call "sleepy ladies" are somewhat averse to our talking and they say we talk excitedly, "Sleepy time is here, ladies!"

COLLEGE WORK BEGINS

The academic year of 1938-39 formally began on October 6, with a student assembly at 3.30 in the afternoon. The assembly hall is a matshed behind the college building, and just accommodates the student body and the faculty on well packed benches. Through the lattice of sides came a pleasant gleam of fall sunshine, as well as a sound hammering of which showed that the carpenters ~~were~~ ^{were} still putting the classrooms together as the students met.

President Wei addressed the college, welcoming the newcomers, and commenting on the situation and peculiar difficulties to be faced this year. After announcements of college regulations, the students adjourned, singing the college song with just as much vigor and spirit as was shown in more prosperous days in Stokes Hall.

ORIENTATION LECTURES FOR FRESHMEN

The most interesting of the announcements at the first assembly concerned a new feature in the college program, a series of lectures for the freshman students, designed to help them orient themselves in the college environment. The usual academic work for freshmen will be postponed until October 20th, but attendance at the orientation lectures is compulsory. The subjects of the lectures follow:

1. The history and organization of Hua Chung college. President Wei.
2. Methods and tools of Study. Dr. I. Hu.
3. The college curriculum. Dr. P. V. Taylor.
4. General scope of the natural sciences and their place in the education of an individual. Dr. T. G. Djang.
5. General scope of the social sciences and their place in the education of an individual. Dr. K. C. Chang.
6. General scope of literature and the arts. Mr. D. F. Anderson and Mr. Pao Lu-ping.
7. General scope of religion and philosophy and their place in the education of an individual. Dr. C. F. Lo.
8. Vocational choice and its preparation. Dr. I. Hu.
9. What it means to be a college student. President Wei.

CLASS SCHEDULE ala Kweilin

To avoid too great a loss of time through air-raids, the class schedule has been adjusted, following the general plan of other Kweilin institutions. As air-raids usually come in the morning, most of the required courses have been scheduled for afternoon or evening, leaving the mornings free for laboratory and library work. Although this will make a long day's work for many, it has the advantage of giving the students daylight hours for their reading, an important consideration here where electricity is either feeble or absent entirely. Since the war, the public schools in Kweilin have operated on an even more stringent schedule, requiring primary and middle school pupils to be in class by seven or six in the morning, allowing a long mid-day recess

during the "air-raid period" of the day.

CLASSROOMS and EQUIPMENT

For the past week carpenters have been at least as much in evidence as students in the college building. As the rooms in the college building are all much too large, it has been necessary to do a lot of work, putting up partitions, repairing floors, and rearranging for the laboratories and the library. Offices are being contrived boarding up part of the veranda which surrounds the entire building. Large lecture courses will have to use the matcheds.

The library is located on the fourth floor of the building, in what is really the attic. Although at the present moment it is a somewhat discouraging look more like the student workshop it should be. Fortunately there are windows on three sides, all offering beautiful views of Kweilin's fantastic mountains, as well as good light and air. Book shelves will be built out of the materials of the packing boxes which now contain the books.

These boxes and crates, and the equipment for the science laboratories arrived last week, chaperoned from Tungan on the train by Mr. Shao the athletic coach, who has supervised their adventurous journey all the way from Wuchang. They were a welcome sight indeed to the teaching staff, who had not hoped to see them for another fortnight at the earliest.

MOVING DAY FOR THE BOYS AND GIRLS

The arrival of freshman girls, and the addition of some of our old students made the girls' hostel at I Hsin Tang on the C.M.S. property much too crowded. So it was with great joy that they moved three classes out of their original hostel and into the building first occupied by the boys. The boys moved on to new buildings which had finally been secured, one rented Chinese house and two houses belonging to the Christian and Missionary Alliance. The great improvement offered by the new arrangement is that it gives each student a few more square inches in which to live and reduces the amount of walking for most of the girls.

STUDENT ACTIVITIES, BUSINESS AND SOCIAL

An unusual number of students find it necessary this term to earn part or all of their pocket money and school fees. Since they are all strangers in this city, it is very difficult for them to find suitable employment. The student self-help department, by advertising in the local evening paper, has secured part-time work as tutors for a few students. A student typing agency is opening for business, and some of the girls are busy knitting and sewing.

Welcoming the new students has provided recreation this past week. On registration day the newcomers were distinguished by gay green caps, and they received the usual amount of advice and teasing.

INITIATING THE NEW DUGOUT

Very fortunately, registration week was very peaceful with no interruptions from the sky. However, on Saturday morning, October 8th, the

siren sounded and at the urgent signal all students and faculty members on the campus retired to the new dugout. During the three hours of confinement there, all had ample opportunity to admire its fine points, and to rejoice that part of it had been completed. The enemy planes, nine all told, circled over the city several times and dropped about seventy bombs near the air field outside the city.

ARRIVALS and NEW APPOINTMENTS

Mr. and Mrs. E. P. Miller of the English Department, the Rev. Charles Higgins of the Music Department, and Miss Iris Johnston, acting librarian, arrived here last Saturday, October 8th. They are temporarily staying in hotels, but will move into a rented house on the main street in a few days.

Mr. K. H. Yuh, formerly professor of Great China University in Shanghai and director of the Shanghai Biological Supply House, has been added to our biology department as assistant professor. Mr. H. F. Wu, one of our own graduates, has been appointed assistant in the same department.

The Department of Economics-Commerce has engaged the following new members:

Liu Choe-lin, assistant professor of Economics. A.B., Fu Tan; A.M., Columbia; formerly professor of commerce at Hsiang Ching University, Canton.

REGULAR FACULTY AND SENATE MEETINGS

The first faculty meeting of the academic year was held on October 3rd at 4.30 p.m. Twenty-two members were present. Dr. Hu was re-elected chairman of the faculty meeting. Miss Bleakley and Dr. T. W. Zee were elected faculty representatives to the Senate.

The Provisional Senate had its concluding meeting on October 6th. The first regular Senat meeting of the year was held today, Oct. 10 at 4.30 P.M.
