

Dear Mr. Scott:-

I am in receipt of yours of the 7th of April,
containing copy of the By-Laws of the Board of Governors
of the Shantung Christian University and Minutes of the
organisation's meetings. I thank you for the same.

The matter in due course will be considered by
our Board. As you know, we have not as yet any American
missionaries on the ground. We will send our missionaries
out early in August. One of our Secretaries, Dr. Drach,
will also visit China some time at the close of the year.
We will not enter into any cooperative movement until our
own missionaries have learned something of the situation
and begun to act for us. You will see that we are cautious.

We understand that the Berlin Mission was somewhat
related to the Christian University. You may be sure that
our Board will consider the matter most carefully as soon as
our missionaries get on the ground, and as soon as we can
take up the matter in the proper form with our Mission in
China.

Permit me a private word. I had a very pleasant time
with your sister, Mrs. Cushman, on the way down to South
America.

As the Charter for this University was secured from the Canadian Government, and as there had to be a Canadian Office of the University mentioned in the Charter, the address you have was inserted, as I am the Recording Secretary of the Board of Governors. The Toronto address, however, is only for legal purposes, the real address being:

Founded in 1904 by the English Baptist and American Presbyterian Missions of Shantung in unison, the Shantung Christian University comprised at first schools of Arts and Science in Weihsien, of Theology at Tsingchowfu, and of Medicine at Tsinan. The two first mentioned were transferred to Tsinan in 1917. A grant of \$200,000 from the Rockefeller China Medical Board enabled the University largely to extend the buildings and staff of the medical school, with which were amalgamated the medical department of the University of Nanking, the Hankow Union Medical College, the North China Union Medical College for Women, Peking, and part of the Peking Union Medical College. In 1924 an Act was passed by the Dominion Parliament of Canada conferring authority to grant such credentials and degrees as are in accordance with the laws of China.

The main purpose of the University is "The advancement of the Kingdom of God through higher education of a distinctly Christian character, with a view to developing a capable and consecrated leadership for the Christian church and community in China." Thirteen missionary societies from Great Britain, the United States, and Canada share in its maintenance. There are two joint boards of administration, the British and the North American, with offices in London and New York respectively, and, deriving authority from them, a "Field Board of Managers in China." The head office of the University is at Toronto.

DEPARTMENTS. (1) School of Arts and Science, providing a 4-years' course for intending teachers and pre-medical and pre-theological instruction. (2) School of Theology, providing a 3-years' course following one year in the School of Arts and Science; also a 3-years' course for graduates in Arts. (3) School of Medicine, providing a 5-years' course following a pre-medical course of at least 2 years. (4) University Hospital with attached training school for men and women nurses. (5) Extension Department for cultivating social and religious contact with the people of the city and district by public lectures, evangelistic addresses, models, graphic charts, etc.

THE MEDIUM OF INSTRUCTION is mainly Chinese (Mandarin); but English is a required subject at the entrance examination and throughout the whole curriculum, and the use of English text-books and reference books is encouraged.

ADMISSION is ordinarily by certification from an approved middle school or by a general matriculation examn. in (1) Chinese Language and Literature, (2) English Language, (3) General Mathematics, and two selected subjects. An intelligence test of common sense and general fitness for University work is applied to all candidates for admission, and a physical examn. must also be passed.

RESIDENCE, ETC. All students are required to reside within the University walls. Dormitories provide accommodation for all. Physical exercise is compulsory.

FEES for tuition. Arts and Science, \$25, Theology, \$10, Medicine, \$30 per semester. Other student expenses \$100 to \$300 per annum.
