My dear Bingham:

In addressing you in this familiar way, I hope you will take it as evidence of my deep interest and affectionate admiration. Just before I left China, Dr. Leonard Hsu went over with me the possibilities of our endorsing an application to the Rockefeller Foundation for a fellowship on the ground that we were inviting you to join our faculty after its completion. You will have received his reply to the effect that financial exigencies precluded our making any such offer to you in good faith. The matter has, however, been on my mind, and during an interview yesterday with Dr. May of the Foundation, we went over your case. He is extremely anxious to make it possible for you to continue your studies in view of the fine reports he has received, and I need scarcely say that I endorsed this as strongly as I could. All such applications from China must now pass through the Vice-President, Dr. S.H. Gunn, now in Shanghai, and, as you know, these fellowships have very specific regulations controlling them. Meanwhile it was agreed between Dr. May and myself that I write you informally to ask how long your present resources can continue and what your actual financial outlook is. Will you not therefore let me hear from you frankly and fully, as to a friend who is deeply interested but feels himself rather impotent. I shall keep in touch with Dr. May and if any comments of mine can help, I shall do my utmost.

Dear Dr. Stuart:

It was a real treat to receive your letter of April 13, apart from the assistance you have been rendering me in my application to the Rockefeller Foundation for another year's fellowship.

Yes, I have received Dr. Hsu's reply to my request, and I understand the difficulties perfectly. In fact, I did not ask Dr. Hsu to approach Yenching for that matter, but I certainly appreciate what you and Dr. Hsu have tried to do for me.

My financial condition will be sound as long as the present fellowship lasts, that is up to the end of August. On account of the necessity of sending some money home and of assisting a friend in this country, and of my own carelessness in expending money, I have not been able to save much this year. So the outlook after the summer is bad. Although I have the hope of receiving occasional aid from the Government of Fukien for another year, you know too well how the present situation at home makes this source entirely unreliable, especially in the case of poor Fukien. Even if I could receive such occasional aid from home, it would be barely enough to pay for tuition at Chicago. Without a fellowship, I shall have to do some part-time work, and that from the standpoint of study is a waste of time and energy.

What now seems to me more important than this financial aid is some real connection with some center of research at home. This question becomes urgent as I am now approaching the end of my training. As there is little possibility at present to be connected with Yenching, I am wondering if you as a friend of mine and with all the knowledge you have of people and institutions at home, and Dr. Gunn as a representative of the Rockefeller Foundation looking for young people properly trained to build up social science in China will try to make the sort of connection that fulfils the routine of the office in China and that I myself am not able to make in a short time. I guess there are some other institutions besides Yenching for which

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the Foundation has a social science program. Given time I might be able to make the necessary arrangement myself. I happen to know the president of Shanghai College quite well. I may communicate with him. Yesterday Dr. Park wrote me on his way to Africa and expressed anxiety over my plans for the future. It seems natural for me to work with some of his students at home. But this matter of fellowship requires speedy action which at present is beyond my capacity, and there are things connected with the Rockefeller Foundation program for China which I do not understand at all. My point is that as we all work for the same purpose, our cooperation should begin as soon as possible.

I feel that in my first letter to you after a long long while, I should dwell on things more important than my own personal needs. But this letter is already too long. If there is any possibility of having a chat with you in New York, I will speak more freely. I shall be in New York to-morrow and shall be in Dr. Harry Stack Sullivan's office till 1 P.M. His phone number is Murray Hill 2-5080. In case you can have lunch or supper with me or can see me sometime in the afternoon or on Sunday, I shall be obliged if you will let me <sup>know</sup> by using Dr. Sullivan's telephone number.



Dear Mr. Dealey:-

Pursuant to our conversation of this afternoon, I am writing my understanding of our agreement with reference to your participation in the support of the projected school of journalism in Yenching University, Peking, China. This is that you will contribute \$500 annually for five years, on condition that a total of \$10,000 annually in such subscriptions is obtained from other American newspaper publishers.

My dear Dean:

I referred your letter of the 8th to my brother, Dr. J. Q. Dealey, because he was an exchange professor in China at one time, teaching at the Shanghai College, and is very much interested in that country's future. Also, because of his familiarity with conditions in the East, I thought he might be able to suggest something.

His reply verbally to me is that there are people with barrels of money in the East watching out for opportunities for proper use, and by using the right kind of contacts it ought to be an easy matter to get all you want. Specifically, he is answering the question in your mind as to how to get this money by a note to me, which I am enclosing herewith.

I think your chances would be infinitely better if you, personally, were to go after some of these people mentioned in the enclosed letter. An appeal to the average newspaper man, in my opinion, would not bring much, mainly for the reason that the average newspaper man hasn't much to give and isn't a giver in that sense. Moreover, to the average man, China is a long way off and his immediate reaction would be "We have troubles enough at home." What you want to do is to strike those folks and institutions that are international-minded and whose outlook is a world one and who have the wherewithal to help in any way that appeals to them.

I hope this suggestion will be helpful.
