Dear Sir:

My dear Mrs. Lee:



It gives me pleasure to enclose a check for \$540.00 for Yenching.

I have been late in distributing the Day of Prayer offerings this year. In the first place the meeting was held about three weeks later than last year. In the second place there has been question in regard to the cost of leaflets for the Union Colleges. Until this year the leaflets that were used in connection with the Day of Prayer were printed and paid for by the Co-operating Committee, which no longer exists. This year it was agreed that the cost of this leaflet should be the first lien on the Day of Prayer offerings for Union Colleges. This year, however, a new plan was tried. Instead of sending out leaflets to the meeting in large quantities, a notice was sent to all contributing groups that four programs were available on application based on the four objects for the gifts.

Miss Tyler has been very much delayed in getting out this program because of the difficulty of obtaining information and pictures for the different Colleges. She informs me that one picture has not even yet reached her.

I am, therefore, holding back from the total amount received the approximate amount which these programs may cost.



It gives me pleasure to enclose a check for ~~\$129.61~~ 131.47

When I made the distribution in May I retained a balance of \$336.70. At that time it was expected to publish the Union College leaflet and to pay for the cost out of this balance. Miss Tyler, however, was held up in the preparation of the leaflet by lack of material from one or two of the Colleges. By the time she received this (I am not altogether sure she ever received it) it seemed inadvisable to print the leaflet this year in as much as the Day of Prayer services were over and there had been no special demand for the leaflet. When I consulted her recently about retaining anything in the treasury to finance the leaflet for the 1931 Day of Prayer Service she said that it had been decided to finance that leaflet out of the \$500 balance retained by the successor to the Cooperating Committee when the latter was dissolved. I have therefore arrived at my figures as follows:

May I have your advice and perhaps your help in the matter of Yenching Women's College publicity through the Federation of Women's Boards?

I am enclosing a copy of the recent leaflet which was gotten out by the Federation. You will see it contains a picture of some of the Home Economics Class girls of Yenching, as well as a picture of what I suppose is part of the practice school. The picture of the girls came from our office but we have never had a copy of the other picture. Miss Tyler of the Federation came over personally and borrowed the former and when sending me this copy of the leaflet explained that she did not state that the girls were a part of the Yenching school ~~xxx~~ because she did not want to use two pictures of the same college, and had already used the picture of the Yenching "Practice College." Of course we see her point but it does seem as if the layout of the leaflet might have been so arranged as not to make the economics class girls appear to be part of Ginling. Furthermore it seems misleading to state "Practice College" when of course the practice school is what should have been the title of the other picture.

Would you not in some way send "a word to the wise," giving specific information about the divisions of Yenching University, showing that "College for Women of Yenching University" is the correct name of the college for women students, and mentioning that the practice school is really under the Department of Education of the whole University, with cooperation from the College for Women? Such a small Chinese building with a title "Practice College, Yenching" is rather incongruous for a college. Or would you suggest some other method? Perhaps Miss Tyler hasn't kept up with progress at Yenching as much as she might.

You will be glad to know that a gift of \$50.00 came in this morning for the Women's College from Miss Kate R. Andrews of Rochester. As soon as I can, I am going to send you and Mrs. Franklin a list of all Women's College gifts which have come recently. Not a great many, but you will want to know how we stand.

You may know that the Department of Education of the Chinese Government requires certain academic divisions for any institution that is ranked as a University. In Yenching there are three schools or colleges: the College of Arts and Letters, the College of Natural Sciences and the College of Public Affairs. There are also two graduate schools, viz. the Research School of Chinese Studies on the Harvard-Yenching Institute Foundation and the School of Religion. The College of Arts and Letters consists of the Department of Chinese, the Department of English, the Department of European Languages, the Department of History, the Department of Philosophy, the Department of Education, the Department of Journalism, the Department of Music, the Department of Religion and the Department of Physical Education. The College of Natural Sciences is made up of the Departments of Chemistry, Biology, Physics, Geography and Geology, Mathematics and Astronomy, Psychology and Home Economics. The College of Public Affairs consists of the Departments of Jurisprudence, Political Science, Economics and Sociology and Social work

Strictly speaking there is no academic unit known as the Woman's College or Yenching College for Women. The University and the Board of Trustees in America do, however, look upon the women students with their faculty as constituting a unit known as the College for Women of Yenching University. The budget of the College for Women is distinct from that of the rest of the University and although the class work is co-educational we still consider it correct to speak of the College for Women. The little practice school is under the Department of Education of the entire University

and is what its name implies, a small primary school where students in the Department of Education can get some practice and training in the art of teaching. It is pretentious a name to speak of this little school as a practice college.

Of course I realize that technical points of this kind cannot be brought out in such a leaflet. I write only that you may yourself have a clearer understanding of the organization of the University in case such information may at some future time be of use. I assuredly hope that the day of prayer may continue to stimulate interest in these colleges for Oriental women as it has done in the past.

COPY of a letter to Miss Florence Tyler, written by Mrs. Lee, on Feb. 10, 1932. *For Miss McCoy,*

Dear Miss Tyler:

I have just received and read with interest the leaflet you have prepared especially for use on the Day of Prayer entitled, "Building with the Orient." You have done a good piece of work and told your story in an effective manner. It may, however, be worthwhile for me to call your attention to one or two small inaccuracies. You speak of the "Practice College" at Yenching. I judge the reference is to the little practice school, a grade school for children of the neighborhood, which is conducted in the modest Chinese building pictured in your leaflet in order to give the students in the Department of Education some actual practice in teaching under expert supervision.

You naturally can hardly have kept in touch with the rather complicated changes in the organization of Yenching University, and you may not know that the Department of Education of the Chinese Government requires certain academic divisions for any institution that is ranked as a University. Yenching University as at present organized comprises three colleges: the College of Arts and Letters, the College of Natural Sciences and the College of Public Affairs. There are also two graduate schools, viz. the Research School of Chinese Studies on the Harvard-Yenching Institute Foundation and the School of Religion. The College of Arts and Letters consists of Departments of Chinese, English, European Languages, Philosophy, Education, Journalism, Music, Religion and Physical Education. The College of Natural Sciences is made up of the Departments of Chemistry, Biology, Physics, Geography and Geology, Mathematics and Astronomy, Psychology and Home Economics. The College of Public Affairs consists of the Departments of Jurisprudence, Political Science, Economics, and Sociology and Social work.

There is not among the academic units one known as the Woman's College or Yenching College for Women. It is, however, the practice of the Institution itself and of the governing bodies in America to look upon the women students with specified members of the faculty as constituting the College for Women of Yenching University. The budget of the College for Women ~~is~~ is distinct from that of the rest of the University although the class work is co-educational. The little practice school is under the Department of Education of the entire University.

Of course all this that I am saying is technical and is not directly pertinent to the publication of such a leaflet as this of yours. I write only that you may yourself have a clearer understanding of the organization of the University in case such information should at any time be of use.

I assuredly hope that the day of prayer may continue to stimulate interest in these colleges for Oriental women as it has done in the past.

Dear Mrs. Lee:

I am glad to have your letter of the 9th. Your remarks about Miss Tyler's thinking us not cooperative rather surprised me, however. As a matter of fact, since last February when Mrs. Williamson first asked me to take up publicity matters with Miss Tyler, we have sent her a good many articles and printed material, which, so far as I know, she has used very little. Just to give you some background should you ever discuss the matter with her, I might say that after making a personal call on Miss Tyler at her office early last spring, we sent her, as soon as available material came from China, two articles which I prepared especially for her.

Last September, at her request, I sent a number of Yenching booklets, Yenching News, and other material to the Women's Interdenominational Union of Philadelphia (Mrs. Griffith) for their meeting on September 28-30, as you will remember, and sent a little later to Mrs. Griffith a sample of the Craftwork leaflets to see whether she would need any of them for the Day of Prayer or other meetings. At her request I sent to China for 500 extra copies for a meeting of the W.I.U. of Phila. on Jan. 28th last. Mrs. Griffith wrote me that these arrived in time and that also she had received the 500 copies of our November Yenching News - we are not printing a February number - to be used for the Day of Prayer tomorrow. At the time I wrote that we were sending the News, I gave Mrs. Griffith an account of "Patriotic Week" at Yenching last December and told her she could use that in any way she thought wise.

Last November I sent Miss Tyler nine articles as follows:

(1) The Yenching Elementary School, (2) Children's Library, (3) China's Children's Day, (4) Nursery School at Chengfu Village, (5) Movement for Christian Homes in China, (6) Sunday School work at Yenching, (7) Sunday School Farewell Party, (8) The People's Livelihood, and (9) an article about a Chinese singer of Western songs who had recently sung at Yenching.

I thought she might use one or two of these articles in some of her publicity. So far I have had no acknowledgment. For the past year we have also sent to Miss Tyler and to Mrs. Griffith ten copies of each of our Yenching News as they came out, and you will remember that we sent several hundred copies of the little booklet "Yenching College for Women - Its Achievements" to Mrs. Meats at Philadelphia last September.

It is pretty hard, as you know, to get news from China, but I think we had made a good start through the efforts of Miss Hague and others, when the war there broke out, so all the news this winter has been about that. Considering what the students are doing in most of the other colleges in North China, I think the Yenching students on the whole are behaving very well, and certainly they have shown a strength in entering as they did in the program of "Patriotic Week." Both Dr. Stuart and Chancellor Wu seemed to be very much pleased with the results of that effort.

I have had it explained to me a number of times so that I feel I understand it very well myself. I spent quite a bit of time trying to figure what it was all about and just what the "but" in your letter involved. I got a copy of the new leaflet and studied it with great care and had a terrible shock when I discovered that the little picture down in the corner said "Practice College, Yenching", this should have been "Practice Cottage, Yenching". This picture was sent to me as a picture of the little cottage where the girls learned housekeeping in its most ideal form, meeting every different group, with the information that there was nothing in this cottage which could not be reproduced in a Chinese home. I am more sorry than I can say about this stupid error. I do not know why I did not catch it in the proof and I further can not understand why I did not see it on the leaflet until this morning. I am sure the picture was labelled "Practice Cottage". Am I wrong about this being the practice cottage? If so, the error is not mine; it came from China as a full description of the cottage, its contents, and the experiences of the Home Economic Girls working in it came with the picture.

Once more, I am more sorry than I can say about this error. It is one of the things which occasionally just gets by, and again many thanks for the technical information contained in your letter.

Thank you so much for the letter from Bulgaria which is as you say of great interest. It seems as though the Day is getting a very fine start there. I would be so grateful for any other interesting letters which you receive from the Mission Fields. We use these in publicity material as we approach the next Day of Prayer.

Do I understand now that you will send to A. M. Baird of Sofia a copy of the Day of Prayer program for 1933 in mimeographed form so that they will have it for next year. We are hoping that these will be available within the next six weeks. Letters will be sent to the Boards asking how many copies they desire to send to the Foreign Field. I am eager to be very clear about this as a letter came in yesterday from Japan saying: "Will you not send us the program as soon as it is ready as it is so late when we receive it from the Boards in December or January." Last year the letters went out to the Boards in June asking how many copies they could use and many of these copies were sent to the Boards in June. Apparently there is delay along the line somewhere. I have no way of knowing to what denomination the woman from Japan belonged, but I am very eager to get these programs to the field as promptly as possible. I do not, however, want in any way to overlap with the work of the Boards and I think we must take care not to do this in view of the fact that our programs go to about one hundred persons all over the world as soon as they are ready, which of course gives the field an opportunity to know that there has been delay somewhere. We want to do this the way the Boards want us to. Programs are sent to the field to National Christian Councils, Literature Committees and Interdenominational groups which have especially asked for the programs.

If you can help me with any suggestions as to methods of procedure on the basis of your experience, I will be grateful. You happen to be the first secretary to send me a letter from the field this year, therefore, I raise the question with you. It would be my understanding that you would continue to send to Miss Baird as before. Am I not right?

I have your letters of March 14 and March 15. The first relates to the procedure in getting the material for the World Day of Prayer to the various mission fields. The procedure hitherto followed so far as our Board is concerned is for your office to send us a sufficient quantity of the material that one copy may be sent to each mission station. Miss Emerson and I as the two women foreign secretaries decide as to the person in each station best suited to accept responsibility for the observance of the day in that station, and then send out the material together with a personal note to each of these missionaries. The missionary to whom the material goes is free to use it in any way she likes. Presumably if there are missionaries of other Boards working in the same center she will confer with them and plans will be made jointly. There is, I suppose, some danger of duplication if several Boards have missionaries in the same centers. Am I right in understanding that there is a suggestion that the responsibility for preparation and distribution of Day of Prayer material be committed to the National Christian Council of each country in so far as National Christian Councils have been organized in the different countries? That would seem to me an excellent plan. Until something of that kind is done I have no suggestions as to any better procedure than that which we have been following. I do not believe that we in this particular office are guilty of sending out the program material too late.

Your letter of March 15 asks for "a copy of the Yen-ching News letter to be used in connection with the study book 'Lady Fourth-Daughter of China,' together with information about Miss Yu Ling Ch-en. The news letter in which Miss Ch-en is spoken of is the one printed in April 1930, a copy of which I enclose. I take it this is the publication of which you would like to have a number of copies on hand. I regret to say that we have in stock only four or five copies. I judge there would be no point in having another edition of the entire leaflet. If there is likely to be considerable call for something about Miss Ch-en, do you think it might be worth while to have the paragraph relating to her and her work struck off as a separate little folder?



You will have noted on our April 30th statements that during April we received through the Federation of Women's Boards the sum of \$55.52 from the Philadelphia Missionary Union.
