Dear Eric:

I am enclosing the statement which you sent to me for suggestions and criticism concerning the general method of financing foreign teachers by the Cooperative Board at Peking. I have jotted down suggestions which I trust you can decipher. The representatives from colleges on the staff perhaps might require some mention in this report.

The recommendation on page 5 that candidates for the faculty must appear before the Candidate Committees of the various Boards might not be a possibility in every case. I am taking the liberty of suggesting that paragraph 5 on this page be changed to read as follows:

" That the application of a foreign candidate for a faculty position not within the quota of any Board shall be acted upon by the Candidate Committee or Department of any one of the Boards in accordance with their usual procedure, and the candidate himself shall appear before the Candidate Committee or before representatives of the Trustees before being accepted by the Trustees, the expenses necessary being met by the Trustees. "

I am writing you also on certain other matters but I am putting this in a separate note with a view to the convenience of your filing system.

I was sorry to hear that you were laid up and it is good to know that you are out again.

REPORT CONCERNING GENERAL METHOD OF FINANCING FOREIGN TEACHERS
IN PLACE OF SUPPORT OF INDIVIDUAL TEACHERS BY
COOPERATING BOARDS

1. Present practice: At present, within the quota of faculty furnished by cooperating boards, each missionary teacher is selected by the mission board with the cooperation of the University and after approval of the candidate committee of the board concerned, the missionary goes to the field as a missionary of that board, with the emoluments, standing and protection in emergency given by that board to all its missionaries.

A second group of the faculty are supported from the general budget of the University. In nearly every case at present on the field the individual teacher has been approved by the candidate committee of some board and rates during the period of his service in the University as a missionary of the board. The salaries and allowances of these missionaries are determined on the basis of the highest salary paid by a cooperating mission to a missionary of the same length of service and family relationships. The University does not regard itself as liable for emergency assistance in case of excessive medical requirements or other contingencies.

Your Committee was directed to consider whether

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some method might not be adopted by which presumably a fixed sum should be provided by the boards in proportion to the number of faculty they agreed to support, the University being responsible for any adjustments which it might be necessary to make.

2. Principles involved: It is the judgment of your Committee that the following principles, having to do with the relation of the universities to the total missionary enterprise, should be considered in the formation of any such plan.

- a. The university is an integral part of the total missionary program. Its impact upon the non-Christian community and its services in the development and strengthening of the Christian community are as vital as those of any other missionary institution.
- b. The distinctively Christian and missionary outlook on the part of the University must therefore be assiduously conserved.
- c. The conservation of this Christian and missionary spirit depends primarily upon the personality of the foreign faculty and their conception of their relation to the missionary enterprise.
- d. (The only) definite relationships which the foreign faculty can have to the missionary enterprise are relationships to the missions and the boards; without such (contacts) the foreign faculty will tend to become purely a university group without the needed consciousness of the problems of other parts of the missionary enterprise, and that intelligent sympathy with them which effective cooperation demands.

It would seem to your Committee that the payment of a fixed sum by the boards for faculty support would necessarily involve a re-adjustment of the salary scales of the members of the faculty under such an arrangement, so that all members of

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the faculty would be on the same basis, this basis being therefore different from the bases of the respective cooperating missions. This would at once make it impossible for the faculty to have an actual membership in the mission and any other than an artificial relationship to it.

Even though it might be practicable to have the members of the faculty who are supported by the funds supplied by the different boards, subject to the approval of the candidate committees of those boards and obtain a technical standing as their missionaries during the period of their service in the University, the effect of this is practically to eliminate such a missionary from the consciousness of the Board, and to make the standing of the teachers in relation to mission and board purely technical, and without that consciousness of definite relationship to a definite agency of the missionary enterprise and its constituency, the Christian Church, which the needs of the total enterprise require.

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Your Committee accordingly makes the following recommendations as to the policy of the Trustees in reference to the appointment and support of foreign members of the faculty:

1. That, as far as possible, foreign members of the faculty should be missionaries of a board of foreign missions.

2. That members of the faculty who are within the accepted quotas supported by the mission boards should be regularly approved missionaries of the several boards selected by the same processes, supported and protected in the same manner, subject to the same regulations, and having the same privileges as other missionaries of the respective boards;

provided, that their appointment to the University shall be subject to action of the Trustees of the University in accordance with their By-Laws.

3. That where vacancies in quotas occur the Board concerned shall reimburse the University \$250 local currency per month during the vacancy.

4. That any Board so desiring may waive the right of selection of the foreign personnel to be supported as a part of its quota. That, in such case, the personnel shall be selected in accordance with the procedure indicated in paragraph 5; the privileges and support, however, being on the basis indicated in paragraph 2.

5. That a foreign candidate for faculty positions not within the quota of any Board, shall appear before and be examined by the Candidate Committee of any one of the cooperating boards as to worthiness for a foreign missionary appointment, and shall not be accepted by the Trustees until such approval together with the approval of the Candidate Committee of the Trustees shall have been given.

6. That the salary of such members of the faculty shall be computed on the basis of the highest salary paid by any of the cooperating missions for similar location, length of service, and family relationships; responsibility for transportation to and from the field being determined in accordance with the contract with candidate at time of appointment; and the University not to be liable for emergency medical expenses.

7. That, (for the stimulation of their foreign missionary consciousness,) each foreign member of the faculty selected and supported as indicated in paragraphs 5 and 6 should in so far as ^{is} practicable be accepted by a mission board as having the status of one of the missionaries for the period during which such person shall be on the staff of the University and, where the mission regulations permit it, be admitted to the status of an affiliated member of the mission; such acceptance carrying with it no financial obligations on the part of the Board concerned.

This might be possible to change to 5 call for added by the Candidate Committee of the Trustees of the Board of Trustees of the University of the South Pacific.

It is my understanding, then, that the appropriation of the Presbyterian Board of Foreign Missions to the Trustees of Peking University for the current year is \$3,500 gold, guaranteed at two for one. This makes the quarterly payment \$875.

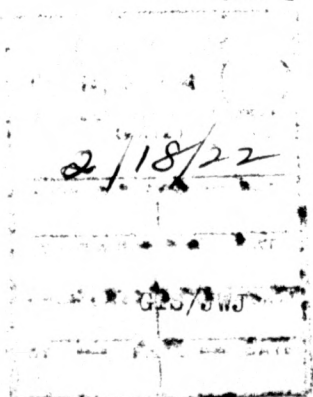

I have a cablegram from Peking containing the following information:

"We heartily approve of the appointment of D. Bess;
we heartily approve appointment Warner English Language;
this does not preclude us from permanent appointment."

There is the further information that they approve the Princeton Department of Political Science and Social Service; and that they heartily approve of the appointment of B. Dell. I had not asked for information on this latter point but I presume Mr. Burgess put the matter up to them. This will mean that if the Princeton Group are ready to go ahead with the sending of Burnham Dell for Political Science this fall, we will need to consider him through our usual processes.

I have written Mr. Warner fully with reference to the matter of the teaching of English Language.

I would wish that it were possible to get the usual candidate papers of Mr. Warner and of Mr. Bess acted on by the Candidate Committee within the near future. I wish very much somebody could see Mr. Bess personally and look him over. My dear Mr. Sellers:

You have been informed by our Candidate Department of the recent assignment of you and Mrs. Sellers to the North China Mission. This assignment was with particular reference to the work in the Peking University in which this Board shares and on the staff of which we guarantee the support of six missionary teachers. At present there are two Presbyterian vacancies on the staff; one of them in the School of Theology of the University. It was with this particular vacancy in view that the Board appointed you to the North China Mission.

In your reading you have doubtless come across various articles within the last few years on the development of Peking University which is a union institution combining the higher educational problems and operations in the Peking district of the American Board (Congregational), the Northern Methodist Board, this Presbyterian Board and the London Missionary Society.

Yenching College for Women is affiliated with the University and will work in close cooperation and to some extent co-educationally with the University. The Princeton work in Peking is also affiliated with the University and the present proposal is that Princeton will take over the department of sociology and immediately related subjects.

Under separate cover I am sending you one of the booklets of the University giving the prospectus of its work and of its building plans. Its office is here in this building with Mr. Herbert K. Caskey as Executive Secretary and Dr. Eric M. North of the Methodist Board as Secretary of the Trustees with office at 150 Fifth Avenue, New York City.

I congratulate you and Mrs. Sellers upon the wonderful opportunity for constructive, Christian service which is presented to you through the opening in Peking University.

Would you be good enough to write to me, probably sending a copy to Dr. Eric M. North, outlining somewhat in detail just what subjects you could undertake to teach in the University with special reference to the School of Theology?

We earnestly hope that your qualifications will fit into the particular needs of the University at this time. If there should by any chance be any doubt in the minds of the University Trustees as to whether you were prepared to carry the subjects which must now be especially provided for, you may

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assured that there are other educational openings elsewhere among our institutions on the mission field where you will be most heartily welcomed.

An assignment to either the North China or the Shantung Mission will be made in the Language School at Peking.

Your correspondence will be with Dr. Arthur J. Brown, Secretary for the Board of the North China Mission.

I do not know that this failure of the American Board to comply with the general understanding would deter the Presbyterian Board from supporting a larger number than does the American Board if such course appeared desirable to the Board, but I believe that the Presbyterian Board would not desire the University to consider it actually obligated to a larger support than that undertaken by the other partners in the enterprise.

I believe that the Presbyterian Board now has on the Peking Staff four foreign missionaries. Will you be good enough to inform me if and to what extent our Presbyterian Board is now being held liable to the University for funds for any (supposed) vacancies in our staff quota.

My dear Scott:

On June 22 the Executive Committee of the Trustees
of Peking University took the following action:

E-1378 "Voted: That the appointment of Mr. L. M. Bocker,
approved missionary of the Presbyterian Board,
to the staff of the University for the term of
three years, be approved, his salary and outgoing
to be covered by income from vacancies in quotas
and from other sources, subject to the concu-
rence of the Presbyterian Board and the approval
of candidate papers of his fiancée."

President Stuart has been anxious for some time to
secure Mr. Bocker as a member of the staff of the University.
I understand, however, that Mr. Bocker is not prepared to go
out for a longer term, in his present judgment, than three
years. The University is prepared to accept him on this
provision as it is understood that the Presbyterian Board

"Re- STAFF QUOTA OF PEKING UNIVERSITY"

-- In response to your letter of June 21, let me say that the quota of the American Board, as recognized by Dr. Barton, is six members of the Faculty. They have maintained up to the present only four missionary members of the Faculty but for two years there has been provided from American Board sources the salary of Mr. T. T. Lew.

In this coming year, if we count in Mr. T. T. Lew, they will have a staff of six as Mr. Lucien Warner is going out under temporary assignment.

With reference to the vacancies in the quota of the Presbyterian Board, you are correct in saying that the Board now has on the Peking Staff four foreign missionaries. In addition to this, by agreement on the field and here, vacancy caused by the resignation of S. M. Gordon is adjusted by the temporary use of the income from the vacancy to support Dr. Lewis Chase who is teaching English in the Faculty. It is recognized, of course, that this is not a permanent arrangement.

The second vacancy is that caused by the appointment of Mr. W. R. Wheeler as Assistant Secretary of the Presbyterian Board. I understand that Mr. Wheeler was elected Assistant Secretary for one year early in May, 1921. Up to that time he had been giving his full time to the work of the University in promotion in this country. I understand that this appointment was made permanent in January, 1922.

It would seem to me that the appointment of Mr. Wheeler as Assistant Secretary in May was specifically an assignment of him to other duties than those which he would have as a member of the Faculty of Peking University and that therefore the vacancy begins at that date.

You have already noted, I believe, the action of the Executive Committee of the Trustees of Peking University, approved by the Trustees, establishing an arrangement by which in case of vacancy the University will receive reimbursement at the rate of \$250 Mexican during the vacancy.

I have your two letters of June 26th regarding the quota which the Presbyterian Board is expected to support on the staff of Peking University and regarding the appointment of Mr. Booker. These matters were considered yesterday by the Presbyterian Executive Council which has been authorized during the summer to act on behalf of the Board.

1. In regard to the staff quota. In view of the fact that the Methodist Board has formally agreed to support six members of the faculty and of the fact that the American Board does support six members, I believe the University may look to the Presbyterian Board for the support of six faculty members during such time as the other two Boards assume like responsibility.

2. The Council considered the suggestion regarding the date of the termination of Mr. Wheeler's occupation as one of the Presbyterian members of the faculty and took the same position as was reported to you some months ago, namely, that the Presbyterian Board does not consider that the financial vacancy on the staff was created until Mr. Wheeler withdrew from the institution in January 1922. The Treasurer of the Board was authorized and directed to pay the University the customary financial equivalent during the vacancy on the staff created by Mr. Wheeler's withdrawal. Mr. Richard H. Ritter, 457 Washington Avenue, Brooklyn, New York, just conferred with me in connection with a possible opening as Student worker at Peking University, the work in mind being practically that of Religious Work Director. I phoned to your office to speak with you about Mr. Ritter and to ask if he could speak to you this afternoon, but was told that you would not be back until the latter part of the afternoon.

Mr. Ritter was graduated from Princeton in 1917 after which he spent approximately two years in Princeton Y. M. C. A. in Peking. He has just completed his second year at Hartford Seminary. Mr. Ritter has applied to the Presbyterian Board for appointment, with work at Peking University in view. He is a member of a Presbyterian Church in Brooklyn which is interested in his going to the Field and would be prepared, I understand, to provide funds for his support.

Mr. Ritter has interviewed President Stuart regarding this work and President Stuart intimated to him that he would like to have Mr. Ritter on the staff of the University, but that it might not be advisable to arrange for him within the quota of six, supported by Presbyterian sources.

I am sorry that President Stuart has left for I do not quite get his point of view, and it is too late to confer with him about it. I understand that there are two Presbyterian vacancies in the quota, and if a man is needed to head up religious work in the institution, and an acceptable Presbyterian candidate is available, I should think that he could best go the institution as a regular missionary with full Board recognition, and on the same basis as the other Presbyterian foreigners on the staff of the institution. I am quite sure that the Presbyterian Board would be only too happy to have as a member of its quota a man responsible for the leadership of the religious life of the students. Presumably Mr. Ritter would desire and be qualified to teach such number of curriculum hours as would not interfere with the primary objectives of his work.

I suggested to Mr. Ritter that you might wish to talk this whole situation over with him, and I am sending him a copy of this letter. He will wish to have some definite decision reached in the not too distant future, so that he can direct the work of his last year at Hartford for the particular service which he would render.

My dear Mr. Scott:

I have your letter of July 6 with reference to Mr. Ritter. Mr. Ritter has been most assiduous in his endeavor to get on the Staff of Peking University. Dr. Stuart has discussed the matter with Mr. Ritter and with me.

As I understand President Stuart's point of view, it is that the position which Mr. Ritter would fill in the University is at the present time not at all one of its primary needs and that while President Stuart would welcome Mr. Ritter to the Staff of the University for the kind of work which Mr. Ritter desires to do, he does not feel justified in doing that to the prejudice of the filling of the very much more urgent positions on the Staff. In a word, I think that President Stuart feels that in the present state of the effort to shape the Faculty vacancies with reference to the real and urgent needs of the University, the type of work which Mr. Ritter would do would be slightly a luxury. I did not get the impression from President Stuart that it would be expected that Mr. Ritter would teach at all though I may be mistaken.

I understand that Mr. Ritter has tried to make the approach to the University through Princeton in Peking, hoping to make available to Princeton in Peking for that purpose the money which the Presbyterian Church, Brooklyn, would provide. Such an arrangement, I understand Dr. Schell feels undesirable from the point of view of the Presbyterian Board.

Your letter of July 17th, 1922, has been received. Mr. Scott is away on his vacation and will not be back until the seventh of August, but I have been looking up the Board action on the matter to which you refer and have found the following information:-

In August, 1911, the Board appropriated three thousand five hundred dollars in gold (\$3,500.00) for the residence for the Rev. and Mrs. Charles L. Ogilvie, but on April 5th, 1920, the following action was taken:

"That the appropriations of \$1,000.00 gold for Registering and Stamping Deeds, and of \$3,500.00 gold for a residence for the Rev. and Mrs. Charles L. Ogilvie, both made in 1911 from the John S. Kennedy bequest, and the appropriation of \$7,000.00 gold made March 16, 1914, for the Union Medical College for Men, all in the Peking Station of the North China Mission, be cancelled as the Executive Committee of the Mission has reported them as unused and not needed for the purposes for which they are appropriated. That the request of the Executive Committee of the Mission that these sums be now appropriated for the objects enumerated in the Rev. A. M. Cunningham's official letter of February 20, reply be made that the amount designated for Mr. Ogilvie's residence should be considered a part of the pledge of the Board toward the new property of the Peking University and should be credited accordingly; that the Board feels that the first claim upon the amounts designated for registering and stamping deeds, and for the Union Medical College for Men should be the completion of any building or buildings in the Mission for which appropriations have been made, but which have not been completed on account of loss in exchange and that they be applied to this purpose."

Up to December 31st, 1921, the money for the Ogilvie residence in the amount of \$3,500.00, was still available for the purpose designated in the Board action of April 5, 1920. However, the Fourth Quarterly Report from the North China Mission, in which such an item might be listed, has not yet reached the Treasurer's Office, but is expected soon. It is almost safe to say that this money is still available, but if when the Fourth Quarterly Report comes we find that this money has been expended, we will advise you of it immediately.

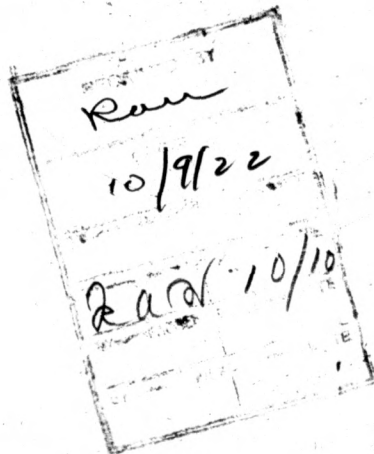

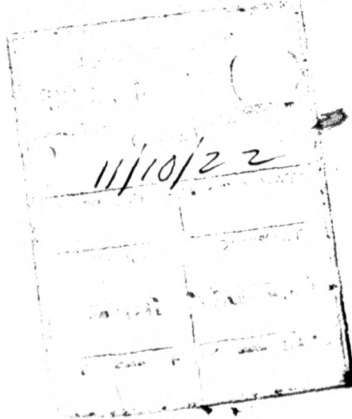
