Though much anxiety, no injury from Chinese soldiers at any time. (Excluding farms, which almost certainly were wiped out).

Institutional losses might reach Local Currency \$10,000.00 to 7 Jan. Breeding animals the biggest single item. Fair number of doors and windows, smashed by rifle butts when soldiers were searching for women or plundering. Middle School kitchen equipment complete. Tools and a large number of incidentals from several buildings. Shells in new dormitory and in Steward's house, neither causing big damage (Japanese shells afternoon of 13th., when Japanese artillery units shelled each other east and west for an hour, as nearly as I could judge; Kuleo Church drew one also).

We will lose much by need for reconditioning buildings after refugees leave, (whenever that millenium comes) especially library, newer dormitories, new science building, and certain residences.

Among University western staff, Daniels lost most heavily, myself next, Wilson, Riggs, Fenn, Brady. Others scarcely touched, though almost all houses entered by soldiers from one to thirty times. Much stuff dumped out and pulled over repeatedly, so we cannot say more on casual inspection. Daniels' loss especially: bedding, rugs, bicycles. Certain of Chinese staff lost a good deal, sometimes effects of relatives or friends placed in their houses. Many had removed the main desiderata: food, bedding, warm clothing, money, watches, bicycles. Japanese show no interest in their losses.

We drove out soldiers many times at considerable risk, but
